There's been so much progress since the last update it's hard to know where to start! With the roof structure in place it feels as though the hardest work has been completed and the finishing touches are going to look stunning.

The roof tiling and lead work will have begun by the time you read this article. The construction of the roof is more complicated than usual because it has been designed to keep the overall height down, which should make the Centre less obtrusive. The feature roof trusses which will be fitted to the entrance area as well as the oak porch, have also been ordered. Many hours have been spent designing and redesigning, speccing and respeccing the roof so we hope you will agree it has been worth it.

The M&E contractor will be installing the underfloor heating pipework soon. The heating will be generated by an air-source heat pump which will make the Centre the most environmentally friendly, public building in the parish. It will also mean that there will be no wall radiators fitted, which will improve the utilisation of wall and floor spaces. Andrew takes a great deal of pride in the air-source heat pump and will be taking bookings for personal tours shortly!

I hope you all made it to Tachfest. Thanks to the Village Events Group and all their volunteers for putting on another fantastic community event. It's lovely to see it developing year on year. Before we know it we could have another Glastonbury or Latitude on our hands. The traffic calming plan for Oakley Wood Road is moving forward steadily thanks to Cllr. Leigh Carter. We are hoping to see final drawings by the middle of August. These measures are being funded by the developer A C Lloyd, thanks to a planning condition attached to the Grove Farm planning permission when it was granted by the committee. This has provided real momentum to this specific project, but we have not lost sight of our decision to develop a Parish-wide strategy for traffic calming.

We are still working towards delivering a new bus shelter for children in Warwick Gates travelling to school. Finding a suitable location has been proving a challenge with so many factors to take account of. A new workable location has been found and we are in the process of finding out who owns the land so as we can apply for permission for the shelter. Cllrs. Carol Gabbitas, Cathy Herbert and Graham Leeke together with residents are creating a welcome pack for our new residents. Once complete this will be available on paper and on-line. They are contacting local groups for contributions, advertising what is on offer. Carol Gabbitas and I, along with our District Councillor Andrew Day are meeting with the District Council to agree the PC's role in helping to shape the

Tachbrook Country Park. We are requesting a seat on the Committee which will determine the design, facilities, etc. This project is a major component of our Sports Leisure and Well-being strategy so we want to make sure it meets local resident's expectations. Please continue to feed in any suggestions or ideas, via our Parish Clerk, Corinne.

As promised and with the help of a keen local resident, we are looking at parking in the village. This initiative will result in a leaflet that parish groups can hand out to their visitors, showing on-street parking, information about parking on the Meadow and out of hours parking at the surgery. We are also exploring other possible parking options including some additional parking on the Meadow. Cllr. Ray Bullen is still working on the Neighbourhood Plan. We have a new examiner and the plan has been sent to him. The examiner is hoping to produce a report by the middle of August. This will set the timetable for the referendum, to approve the Neighbourhood Plan. The vandalised benches on the Meadow have now been repaired. The Play area has been inspected and we will be arranging for some of the issues to be addressed. The Paul's working party is meeting regularly and really making a difference. The Church Lees path has now been cleared and next priorities are being lined up: maintenance on the perimeter path in Warwick Gates, work on the cycle way etc. If you wish to help

August

Sow cabbage (Chinese/spring), pakchoi, turnip, winter salads green manures for soil protection, such as crimson clover, mustard, phacelia

Grow Exclude light from celery stems by surrounding with newspaper and pulling up soil ('blanching')
Pot up rooted strawberry plants ('runners')

Take cuttings of herbs, e.g. rosemary, bay, hyssop

September

Sow 'green manures' for over winter soil protection, such as winter-tares, grazing rye

Grow Pot-up herbs for the kitchen during winter

Boost growth of brassicas (e.g. cabbage) with 2.5cm thick compost 'mulch'

Sudeley is situated on the outskirts of the lovely Cotswold village of Winchcombe. Although its history goes back to Anglo-Saxon times and boasted a Benedictine Monastery in the 10th Century, our introductory talk was devoted to its colourful history after the mid-15th century, when Thomas Boteler, a successful admiral, built Sudeley into a comfortable country house with his spoils from war and was created the first Baron Sudeley. By 1483 it had passed to Richard III who built the Banqueting Hall, the grandeur of which can be imagined from the height and grace of the windows of the picturesque ruins.

The house is connected with several important historical events. It was in the possession of Henry VIII when he and Ann Boleyn visited in 1535 for a meeting with Thomas Cromwell to discuss the Dissolution of the Monasteries - and that resulted in a momentous event! 12 years later the Castle and Dukedom of Sudeley were granted to Thomas Seymour, (brother of Henry VIII's 3rd wife, Jane Seymour, and uncle of Prince Edward) in recognition of his military in the war against France. Catherine Parr had a romantic attachment to Thomas Seymour but followed her duty to Henry VIII by becoming his 6th and last wife. When Henry died a year later, Catherine and Thomas married and lived at Sudeley, along with Lady Jane Grey and Catherine's step-daughter, Princess Elizabeth. A year later Catherine died after giving birth to her first child. Thomas Seymour didn't attend her

funeral because he rushed to London in pursuit of power: he was executed the following year for treason – but that's another fascinating story of scandal, jealousy and intrigue in those troubled Tudor times. Elizabeth, then Queen, visited Sudeley in 1592 to celebrate in style the vanguishing of the Spanish Armada and she must have had mixed memories of her time there with Catherine and Thomas. Upon hearing of the execution of Thomas in 1549 she is recorded as saying "this day died a man of much wit and very little judgement". Charles I had his headquarters at Sudeley during the civil war, which resulted in the destruction of most of its fine buildings by Oliver Cromwell and its decline into an overgrown ruin.

The famous glove-makers, the Dent brothers, bought the estate in 1837 and set about restoring/ rebuilding the house. The final restoration was carried out by their nephew and in particular his wife from Kentucky, the remarkable Lady Emma Dent /Brocklehurst who, over a span of 45 years at Sudeley, managed to fill the interior with fine art and objects associated with the long history of the estate.

The current owner of the estate, Elizabeth Lady Ashcombe, lives with her family in part of the Castle, but the library and a cosy sitting room are open to the public, and a succession of 14 rooms exhibiting the history of the building and displaying treasures collected by Lady Emma - such as paintings by Rubens, Van Dyke and JMW Turner, Civil War memorabilia, Tudor miniatures, and Jacobean embroidery.

The castle is surrounded by very enjoyable landscaped gardens, primarily the result of the 19th century restoration. The Queen's Garden is a model of the original Tudor parterre, designed during the time of Katherine Parr; the rose garden includes over 100 varieties and a modern 'Secret Garden' was worth the search. Wild flower, medicinal herbal and scented gardens complete a sunny afternoon's stroll and lead to a collection of pheasants from around the world, tea and cake and the coach for the journey home.

Ok Hedgehogs, two years ago we had five in and out of the garden, turning up together to 'argue and snuffle chat'. Last year we had three. I put in a deluxe, fab hedgehog house in the garden tucked under a conifer, cozy - perfect. This year none! Apart from several that didn't make it across the road and a late night scamperer around the outskirts of Leamington I haven't seen any, not even a tell tale poo. The numbers have dropped from our 30 million before the war to less than a million now. I had hoped we were a bit of a stronghold here, just hoped they have moved location and will be back. If not that's sad

Ok, now lifting it a bit. Spotted Fly Catchers are on the up yearly! Small bird like a plain Robin - not flashy - pale grey browns and more streaks than spots. They manoeuvre in a way Robins can only dream of. They find a well-placed perch with an open view then wait for an insect to pass by, and then hurl themselves at it returning to their perch beak filled. Then they become flashy.

I was working in Stratford. As I put up my ladder against a climbing Hydrangea out flew a Fly Catcher. Tucked inside was a small nest with two chicks and an unhatched egg. The youngsters can't have been hatched very long, their eyes were closed and they had hardly any downy fluff. As my shadow blocked the light their beaks instinctively opened wide. They thought their parent had arrived with

food. They didn't open their eyes or make a sound. They barely knew they were born. I moved away as fast as I could and the parent returned. These little birds over-winter in Africa and, like the Swallows make the long journey back to us to breed. They were fairly common in the 1980s then they suffered a crash, so its great to see them coming back. I've seen three nests this year.

Whilst up the ladder I came close to a House Martins nest. I looked up just in time to see a youngster turn round and put its tail out of the nest and very efficiently poo hitting me on the shoulder. Its lovely being so close to Nature. I'm not bitter though.

I was only thinking the other day that I hadn't seen Ravens for a while. Out of a clear blue sky came a distinctive croaky call. Not the usual two but seven Ravens in a neat squadron flew over, possibly a couple of family groups. A pair each side chattering and displaying as they passed.

Down below on the garage roof a female House Sparrow hopped onto the gutter and filled her beak with water. She fluttered back to her three youngsters several times and gave them a drink. Not really noticed that before.

I remember a recent scribble mentioned a deluxe caterpillar, hairy and chocolate and coffee brown. Well the lovely Poole

Ben, his mum, dad and fiancée did the vast majority of the work themselves, except fitting the log burner and redoing the electrics. They even managed to keep the renovation costs to within 10% of their budget—Kevin McCloud (Grand Designs) would be impressed!

The café is situated on the Chesterton Road, about 10 minutes from Bishop's

on Saturdays and Sundays.
It serves cooked breakfasts, bacon and sausage baps, daily specials, sandwiches, cakes and hot and cold drinks.
Apparently the milkshakes are 'delicious'. There's also a shop selling local products from local sellers such as preserves, handmade confectionery and blankets.
Outside there's a plant stall and gardeners' corner for green fingered visitors.
