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Over the past week my senses seem to have been bombarded with this years slew of Christmas television adverts with each store pulling at our heartstrings, whether it is a little girl sending a telescope to an old man on the moon, to finding the perfect gift for your loved one to having a red handbag standing in for Jesus with the line – Who are you worshipping this Christmas!

Once again, consumerism seems to be rife, with the shops already full of every possible thing one can think of to purchase at Christmas time, much of it gaudy and inappropriate, much of it inordinately expensive. I was reminded of a saying of a very wise priest, John Pratt, who on visiting the Festive Gift Fair at the NEC last year, commented to Ros his wife, that he hadn't realised there were so many things he didn't need or indeed want!

"But, what do you want for Christmas?" we ask one another; a question I do not like for it seems to miss the mark about present giving. I remember the first time, unprompted by my Dad, I bought a gift for my mum. It was so important to get it just right, to invest this gift with love, I didn't just want it to be something Mum would just like, I wanted it to be something she would treasure, something that had something of me, the giver about it so that in years to come she would say. "I remember Elaine giving me this!" So I rather think that all the window displays, jingles and sumptuous on-location filming simply cannot be of

any use because they know nothing about me and focus always on the recipient and barely at all on the giver.

"God so loved the world that he sent his only son." As the fever of our Christmas preparations begin, let us remember the true meaning of the season and, in buying our gifts, try to invest them with a sense of ourselves, of the things we value and want to say to those we love, just as Jesus came to us with an everlasting message for all humankind. Traffic calming / safer route to school village enhancement scheme—

When a major development is constructed, it is usually the case that a contribution is made by the developer to the Local Authority for upgrading and improving the local infrastructure. To satisfy planning conditions relating to the Grove Farm development, AC Lloyd has made funding available for a traffic calming scheme along Oakley Wood Road in Bishop's Tachbrook.

The objective of the proposed scheme is to reduce vehicle speeds passing through the village to improve road safety and the surrounding environment for residents, pedestrians and all road users. As part of this scheme Warwickshire County Council will also be implementing a safer route to school between the Leopard Public House and Bishops Tachbrook C of E Primary School.

The features & benefits of the scheme will be presented at a public meeting to be held at Bishops Tachbrook School at 19:30-20:30 on the 12th January 2017 to which all residents are welcome.

By the time you read this article, hopefully you will already be aware that yet another planning application has just been received for a large housing development in our rural landscape. This time its for an additional 150 houses on the land opposite the Meadow development on Oakley Wood Road. This site is not in the Local Plan nor our draft Neighbourhood Plan. Our local housing need is for less than 15 homes so is it right that we sustain even more in addition to the 2000 that already have planning permission in the parish? If this goes ahead, in the future up to 50 local children will have to be bused out of the area to other schools. The application number is 16/2076 (land on the south east side of Oakley Wood Road). We urge you to comment on the District Council website or in writing. It is very important that Planning Officers and the Planning Committee understand the strength of local feeling.

Onto more positive news, a great time was had by all at the Bonfire event. Thanks to the Village Events Group who always put so much time and effort into organising this fun community, family event and to the Sports and Social Club for making everyone very welcome on the night of this huge annual event. The fireworks and finale were better than ever this year.

Thanks to the residents and councillors who helped with the bulb planting in November. Again a great community event which will make our parish a more colourful place next spring. And of course thank you to the organisers Graham,

Carol, Lisa and Paul.

As planned councillors spent productive time in November thinking about the major changes that are unfolding which will give rise to new "villages" at Grove Farm. Lower Heathcote and The Asps. As anticipated we discussed how we would both socially and physically connect these communities sites around the proposed country park. We reflected on the importance of schools in providing a hub and sparking new friendships between parents as well as children! There will eventually be four primary schools across the Parish. Our existing school sets such a high standard and we hope the new schools will also built such great reputations. The first of these at Lower Heathcote will open its doors next September and the second at the Oakley Wood Road/ Harbury Lane crossroads 2 years later. We heard also that proposed boundary changes could bring Lower Heathcote into parish when the consultation process has run its course and the changes are approved by the Government.

Requests for section 137 grants for community groups will be considered in the February meeting. A notice will be placed on noticeboards and in the February Parish magazine. Please submit your grant requests as soon as you can. The Clerk can email a form to you or there is one on the website. A resident very kindly mended the dog waste bin on St. Chad's earlier this year. Since this is a District Council responsibility we have just been told that they will be refunding the cost of the

materials. We are seeking a similar claim for the work carried out by our Working Party on the Warwick Gates roundabouts. The allotment rents will remain the same for 2017.

The District Council has just agreed locations for a bus shelter on Warwick Gates, new benches and outdoor gym equipment. We hope to be moving forward with these projects early next year.

Unfortunately our parish mower has broken again. After much consideration the Parish Council has decided to invest in a new industrial mower. Cllrs. Whitwood and Leeke will be looking at various models over the next couple of months. We thank the resident who has been allowing us to use their mower whilst a new one is purchased.

The noticeboard on Warwick Gates has been vandalised we believe between lunchtime on 12th November and Tuesday 15th. If you saw anything please contact the Clerk or the Police.

Thanks again to Cllr. Ray Bullen who has been representing us at the public examination into the Local Plan. I'm sure Ray will provide an update once the examination has finished.

It is looking likely that the work by the developer on the Meadow cycleway will start sometime in January. As soon as we know the date we will inform nearby residents, allotment holders and the Sports and Social Club. A note will also be put on the website.


Parish Magazine—welcome to our new readers in Lancaster Way, Duckett Place, Biffin Way and Parker Drive

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History Group - Zephaniah Job - the Smugglers' Banker

The scene of our November talk by Anthony Adamms was the charming village of Polperro in Cornwall, now a popular tourist destination, but a remote fishing village from the 11th century.



The sheltered harbour and abundant catches of pilchards provided work for all the family – as sailors/fishermen for the men, and for the women and children ashore, the cleaning, pressing, salting and curing of the day's catch before packing into barrels. The wars with America, France and Spain provided another, more lucrative source of income from the sea.....smuggling and privateering. The high tariffs/taxes imposed on goods imported or exported from the enemy encouraged the smuggling of goods such as spirits, tobacco from America, silks and other luxury items. Large ships would collect and transport goods to Guernsey, where they were offloaded to smaller vessels which could access venues such as the remote harbour of Polperro - an ideal base to secretly unload this contraband. Mr Adamms recommended a visit to the Museum of Smuggling, housed in a

former canning factory.

Privateering, on the other hand, was carried out by an armed ship which was privately owned, manned by between 40-60 sailors and commissioned by the Government to harass, fight or capture enemy ships. We were shown sale notices from this period, which showed that a ship of this type was valued at £135,000 – a large investment in the 18th century. Larger ships were manned by up to 250 men. The cargos of captured vessels were offloaded and sold to recompense the ship-owner, but a loss for the Exchequer. Either of these ventures called for substantial financial investment and control.

Enter **Zephaniah Job.** Nothing is known of this man's background. (Had he been involved in some nefarious act in his early life, as rumoured?) He moved to Polperro as a schoolmaster, but combining his skills as an administrator with vision and financial acumen, he set about providing finances for investors in lucrative privateering and smuggling, thus improving the financial lot of local people, who could supplement their income from fishing. When Zephaniah died in 1822 aged 73, he had repaid all his debts and all his papers were burnt - the 18th century equivalent of data protection: there was no historical evidence regarding his activities. In 1900 a researcher moved to Polperro to explore family histories and geneology and the effects of intermarriage. During his stay the village watermill was renovated and in the attic an enormous trunk was discovered, full of official papers relating

to Zephaniah Job. He had organized the financial management of the smuggling trade, set up and issued bank notes drawn on the Bank of Polperro, backed up by letters of credit to the Government to repay in the future. He had looked after the estate of Sir H Trelewney -Rector and JP - who was a useful contact when one of Zephaniah's workers was accused of murder, but acquitted by the jury. He was a hard taskmaster, but supported his workers. He was trusted, respected and was generous to the community, paying £7,766 for the repair of the harbour following storm damage. Our speaker assured us that everything in his talk was based on the official documents, rather than myth and rumour and we had the benefit of seeing copies of contemporary documents, including a bank note for £500, drawn on the Bank of Bishop's Tachbrook!

He explained how healthy woodland supports wildlife, some of which we saw, including Fly Agaric toadstool and the Dor beetle(one of Britain's largest dung beetles). The latter is one of Karl's favourites, which performs an important function for those pets whose owners forget their doggie bags!

We enjoyed the leaf colours. About 35 of us walked including little ones in push chairs to older friends who might be receiving pensions.



Karl emphasised the need for long term planning and defended the recent tree felling and ride widening projects ,with the resulting muddy paths and increased bramble growth, as an inconvenience to be borne for the sake of future generations of people and wild life.

More changes to our bus services

Although a new timetable was introduced only in June, there are more changes afoot – not all bad, we're happy to say.

Stagecoach have decided that the 75 is not economically viable, so it will be withdrawn on 17 December.

They will replace it with a new route 76 designed to serve residents moving into the new estates on Harbury Lane. The 76 will run hourly from Heathcote Park, turn left onto Tachbrook Road, then Othello Avenue and so to Leamington – a 25 minute journey.

Meanwhile the route of the 77 Johnsons service is being adjusted :

- It will take a circular route through the village, travelling anti-clockwise along Argyll Way, St Chads Road, then turning left down Mallory road.
- On its southerly leg to/from Kineton new stops on Oakley Wood Road will serve Oakley Meadows residents.
- In the other direction the route will go straight over the Harbury Lane crossroads, turn left along Heathcote Lane, thence via the Retail Park as now to the station, parish church and terminating at the top of the Parade.

The net effect of these changes are:-

- The service between the village to/ from Leamington will be hourly, not twice an hour as now;
- The new 77 route enables you to reach the Heathcote Hospital direct and also with a short walk the post

- office at Acre Close; You can reach Warwick by changing onto a 68 at Heathcote Hospital;
- Warwick Gates and Mallory Grange residents will be able to catch the 77 or 76 to Leamington;
- People living on Harbury Lane can take the 76 direct to Leamington.

For wider destinations the 77 reaches Kineton in 26 minutes. And after a 5/10 min wait you can transfer to buses going

to Banbury or Stratford. For these onward journeys the same day ticket is valid.

The timing of some of the on-going services will be changing slightly —so keep an eye out for the new timetables.

We are aiming to generate a composite timetable covering all bus services ready to make a centre page spread in February's magazine.

We hope these notes are helpful and will encourage more people to consider "taking the bus".
