February 1st 10am **Candlemas** Come and join us in a special service of Light – children all get glowsticks as we remember the Presentation of Jesus as represented in our Morris window.



After an action packed 2014 with the Winter Olympic Games in Sochi, World Cup in Brazil, Commonwealth Games in Glasgow and the amazing battle of Rosberg and Hamilton for the Formula One world championship you would think that 2015 would be a quiet year, but that is not so. There are hundreds of sporting events going on so let's begin with January.

Between the 8-11th of January there was the Autosport international show at the NEC in Birmingham. This year's show had 7 star guests from 4 series. They were former F1 driver David Coulthard. Endurance and Le Man driver Allan Mcnish, World Rally champion Petter Solberg and 4 BTCC drivers including current champion Colin Turkington, Honda teammates Gordon Shedden and Matt Neal and 2013 champion Andrew Jordan. On show were all the cars from the 2014 F1 championship excluding Caterham and Marussia who have gone into administration. Each of the star guests had a go at the tyre change competition to get one tyre off and another on in the quickest time and it was won by Andrew Jordan who did it in just over 24 seconds.

This month was the **Skeleton Bob World Cup** and Olympic gold medallist Lizzy Yarnold made her return to the sport after her success in Sochi. After experiencing dizziness in Canada she came back strong in Germany and finished 0.04 seconds behind Russian Maria Orlova. In one of the previous World Cup event in Lake Placid she took gold. How the Romans stung us (British food from Romans to Saxons)

So, in addition to straight roads, baths, towns, the Romans also brought us nettles! They introduced them to our island as a salad vegetable.

Here's a Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall recipe for nettle soup. I aim to try this when nettles start growing in February. Apparently it's a Valentines Day must in Hugh's household.

Ingredients

Around 150g nettle tops 30-35g knob of butter 1 onion, peeled chopped 1 large or 2 smallish leeks, trimmed, washed and finely sliced 2 celery sticks, chopped 1 clove garlic, peeled and chopped 2 tbsp white rice, such as basmati 1 litre vegetable (or chicken) stock Sea salt and freshly ground pepper 6 heaped tbsp thick, plain yoghurt, and 1 small bunch chives, to finish

What to do

Pick over the nettles, wash them thoroughly and discard the tougher stalks.

Melt the butter in a large pan over mediumlow heat, add the onion, leek, celery and garlic, cover and sweat gently for 10 minutes, stirring a few times, until soft but not brown. Add the rice and stock, bring to a simmer and cook for 10 minutes.

Add the nettles, stirring them into the stock as they wilt, and simmer for five minutes or so, until the rice and the nettles are tender (very young nettle tops will need only two to three minutes).

Season with plenty of salt and pepper. Purée the soup in two batches, reheat if necessary and check the seasoning.

Serve in warmed bowls, topping each portion with a large dollop of yoghurt and a generous sprinkling of snipped chives. The Romans also brought us cherries, cabbages and peas, as well as improving the cultivation of crops such as cereals. And they brought us wine!

The Saxons were excellent farmers and cultivated a wide variety of herbs. These were not used just for flavour as they are today but to pad out stews.

Saxon Hare, Rabbit, Veal or Chicken Stew Ingredients

50g (2oz) butter

1 -1.5kg (depending on the amount of bone) of hare or rabbit joints, stewing veal or chicken joints 450g washed and trimmed leeks, thickly sliced

4 cloves garlic, chopped finely

- 175 g pot barley
- 900 ml water

3 generous tablespoons red or white wine vinegar

2 bay leaves, salt, pepper

15 fresh, roughly chopped sage leaves

What to do

Melt the butter in a heavy pan and fry the meat with the leeks and garlic till the vegetables are slightly softened and the meat lightly browned.

Add the barley, water, vinegar, bay leaves and seasoning. Bring the pot to the boil, cover it and simmer gently for $1 - 1 \frac{1}{2}$ hours or till the meat is really tender and ready to fall from the bone.

Add the sage and continue to cook for several minutes. Adjust the seasoning to taste and serve in bowls— the barley will serve as a vegetable.

Parish Council News

A busy start to the new year yet again.

The **Mallory Road Safer Crossing Point** working party met on 16th January to review options. Three local residents came and gave their views, along with Parish Councillors and a County Highways engineer. Also Cllrs. Leeke and Gabbitas met the County Council to discuss bus shelters and bus stop locations. We hope to have an update on both projects in the next edition.

Cllr. Brookes is looking into the safety issues that have been raised regarding the **fencing around the solar park, maintenance of Warwick Gates perimeter fence and the ownership of the traffic "islands" in Warwick Gates.** We would like to see these features maintained to a higher standard but at the moment we are having difficulty finding out whose responsibility this is.

Councillors agreed make a **Section 137 grant** of £350 to Tachbrook Tinies; the mother and toddler group which meets on Thursdays at the Sports and Social Club.

Vehicle Activated Sign on Oakley Wood Road should be installed by 31^{st} March 2015. A local business has kindly donated £1,500 towards this and the Parish Council has received a grant for £3,000 which makes the shortfall (if there is one) minimal.

The proposed **traffic signal scheme** on the Tachbrook Road at the junction with Othello Avenue and the access into the new estate has been reviewed. A suggestion has been made that a mini roundabout might be a better solution. This has been put forward to County Highways. Within this scheme we are requesting a bus stop, bus shelter and a lay-by to serve both Stagecoach passengers and school bus services.

The **block paving** around the junction of Bolingbroke and Cicero have been removed because they were lifting and becoming hazardous. As a temporary fix tarmac has been laid. The District Council is liaising with the Forestry Services, as they believe the roots of the trees need attention before the paving can be re-laid.

The BMX noticeboard has been removed for repairs. It will be returning shortly.

The draft **Neighbourhood Plan** is ready for adoption by the Parish Council. Councillors will be considering this shortly. Once approved the plan will then be forwarded to the District Council and then the examination should begin.

Cllr. Leeke has walked the parish, with an officer from the District Council, pointing out the **vegetation which needs cutting back, the condition of the bins and litter.** We hope that this will be actioned shortly.

Cllrs. Bullen and Leeke met with residents and Severn Trent Water to discuss the **sewage issues** in the village. Severn Trent has now carried out a CCTV survey of the sewer and they have cleansed the pipe. They are now investigating what is causing the flooding and the best way to resolve it. We have been told that this process can take

some time to complete as they need to make sure that any solution they propose will resolve the flooding in the long term.

The budget has been set and councillors have reluctantly agreed to raise the precept by around £2.50 per year on a Band D property. This rise has been necessary because of the amount of money spent this year on professional advice required to respond to Gypsy and Traveller Site planning consultations.

The next meeting is on Thursday, 12th February when we hope to receive an update from the Police.

St Chad's Centre News

Having just ushered in a new year the parish is beginning an exciting new chapter in its history.

Since 1945, as the village was expanded with successive new housing developments added, various community attempts were made to create a village and church hall facility – all have failed. With permission granted for up to 150 new homes to be built off Oakley Wood Road, the population will further increase. Locating this important amenity at the heart of the local community will benefit all ages of residents.

The absence of such a hall in Bishop's Tachbrook is actually quite an anomaly. Did you know that Bishop's Tachbrook:

•Is the only Parish or Town Council area in Warwick District not to have the benefit of a village, or even a church, hall.

•Is the only village in Warwick District with a population larger than 150 people, which is not able to use such a facility.

•Has the 3rd largest population of the Warwick District parish council areas (2,558 people at 2011 Census) and will expand as the new homes are built.

Consultation, surveys and research dating back more than a decade identified community facilities residents in Bishop's Tachbrook would like. The agreed plan was for a new building to be centrally located on land previously set aside for this purpose in the churchyard, adjacent to the village green.

To realise this plan, in 2012 The St Chad's Centre Trust Company Ltd was established and registered as a charity. Trustees were nominated by the Parish Council and the PCC, as well as others from potential users of the new facility.

A 99 year peppercorn land lease was granted to the Trust and over £100,000 raised from personal donations and community fundraising, almost all of which has been spent completing the detailed Centre design, obtaining consents for planning, listed building, ecclesiastical faculties and completing precommencement conditions. The short section of foundations constructed protects the Centre's planning permission in perpetuity.

The 2013/14 tendering process identified a preferred building contractor and, allowing for contingencies, a further investment of £500,000 would be required to complete the building. BT Parish Council granted £50,000 and Warwick District Council added a grant of £300,000, and agreed to underwrite the additional fundraising for the remaining £150,000 required.

So what's new for 2015? With pens poised over the contracts the Trustees are delighted to announce that the construction phase is planned to begin in April 2015, running through until the end of November 2015. This then allows time for commissioning and an official opening before the end of the year.

By Christmas, Trustees expect the Centre to be up and running for bookings. It will be available to book through the Parish website, with users registering to enable them to view availability. Rates and a timetable of events/groups will be pub-


lished.


The Trustees and all who have been involved in the creation of the St Chad's Centre believe it will stand at the heart of our community, transforming village life and afford safe and comfortable facilities that encourage interaction and sustain interest in activities and events that directly enrich resident's lives. In a few years time we will look back and wonder how we coped without simple amenities like toilets for events on the village green or a base for groups who have stoically managed using the church's mediaeval facilities. Trustees will judge if the St Chad's Centre has been a success if it is being used, with utilisation rates over 50%, by a diverse range of groups of all ages who are coming together not just for their own benefit, but to also serve the wider community.

What Price Cabbages?

The overall average value of English farmland in 2014 is currently reported to be £10,000 per acre. Clearly various individual factors will impact on the value any particular packet of land, but one can use this published average to do some admittedly crude sums.

For instance, 16.13 acres of farmland might have a value of £160,000. Should this land get outline planning permission for housing development, its value can apparently soar 60 fold, maybe even higher, when it could then be sold for upwards of £9,600,000.

If 150 houses were built and sold on that land and if the average price of those houses was £275,000, the sum total of those transactions would be £41,250,000.

Nature Page

As we all know practise makes perfect. That can apply to birds too, especially those determined to get the food others seem to enjoy. Our resident Robin's balance has improved since last year and I can only conclude that all the effort it put in to try and hang on to the little perch on the feeder has paid off as it can now perch and feed for a few minutes, that is as long as the feeder does not start swinging.

Two Long tailed Tits appeared on the feeders in early January. I wondered where the rest of their gang were but decided these two were the stragglers and, as so often the case, I was not looking out during those brief minutes as they pass through. The Blue Tits and Great Tits are visiting regularly and enjoy the fat balls as well as the sunflower hearts.



I caught a brief glimpse of another bird - was it a Great tit, no - I wished it would not keep disappearing into the Buddleia so I could be sure. Several days later I caught sight of it on

the birdbath and then I was sure it was a Blackcap, a male with a black cap not the brown of the female. They are supposed to be summer visitors but some have over wintered with us. I must try to recognize the song, as it is a member of the warbler family and so has a pretty trilling song.

Friends of mine who live in Holt Avenue have friendly Blackbirds who know exactly what they need and how to communicate those needs to their humans. So, one frosty morning, the humans were alerted to a pressing need by the noise of the Blackbirds sitting by the birdbath. Eventually the humans realised what was needed and while the Blackbirds waited on the fence the ice was broken and fresh water provided so the blackbird morning bath could take place. The humans kindly refilled the bath after the blackbirds had emptied it and required a refill.

The activity of the bird life reminds us that all of nature is not sleeping through the winter and there is evidence of other creatures still busy. There are fresh molehills along the verges and in some fields around the village. It is probably warmer underground.

The badgers are also be busy but some have not learnt about road safety and have ended up as road kill. We also saw a dead fox and a young deer at the roadside.

So what about the flora? Just before Christmas we spotted our first Hazel catkins and by the second week of January there were plenty although they don't usually appear until February.

I was surprised to see a daffodil in a garden in Surrey having just welcomed the first snowdrops in our garden but then a friend in Wellesbourne showed us her first daffodil three days later. If there are any early butterflies or other insects about



there is a chance of a nectar feed.

The weather is cold and windy as I type this and more bad weather could be on the way before we are truly into Spring.

Boxing Day. Attracted to a beautiful bird with tail continually wagging! on foliage in pond. Spent about 20 minutes pecking around the foliage in pond. Very confident about the water, where other birds are very wary of committing themselves, even if they want a drink. Identified as Grey Wagtail. Just beyond the bottom of the garden stands a young Hawthorn tree. It is not just any hawthorn; it's the chosen community centre for our sparrow colony. This tree is the place to be, it catches the sun all day, should there be any. Some days just the male sparrows sit in its branches, often chattering to each other, a bit like gentlemen who sit in the Royal Priors watching the world go by. At other times the females join them, then there is more chattering and moving around.

At the other end of the garden around 30 Goldfinches take turns on the feeders they've been there since first light. Now and then the sparrows decide to launch a raid on the sunflower hearts. On a signal only known to them the sparrow squadron takes off zooming up the garden. They quickly muscle in pushing the finches aside. After a few minutes the squadron returns to base to preen and chatter. That is until a Blackbird sounds the alarm call. A Sparrowhawk moves through at speed, wings outstretched hoping to live up to its name. In a split second all the Sparrows disappear deep inside the thorny branches. The Hawk passes them by. All for one and one for all.

When the settlers arrived in America they missed the chirpy Sparrow so a small number were shipped across the Atlantic. They did well and soon spread. I can see why they missed the chirpy chappies.

I was told by Margaret in Hunningham of her close relationship with a Robin. It would often follow her around the garden grabbing any insects she disturbed and watching everything she did. One day she stooped down to look at a plant the robin landed in front of her. She felt something brush the side of her face as a Sparrowhawk flew over her shoulder and the Robin was gone. She hardly realised what had happened. Fingers crossed the robin didn't either. That was a bit "Tales of the Unexpected" wasn't it?

On the brighter side I watched a group of eight Black-headed Gulls, they only have black heads in the breeding season and even then its chocolate brown! In winter they have what looks like a chocolate button to the side of each eye. Anyway, they were all parked in the playing field squabbling and squawking (boy can they squawk!) all argu-

ing over small areas of grass. After some time they had spread themselves out and sorted a pecking order. Then, to my surprise, each one began a little dance standing in one spot and paddling their webbed feet up and down, they would stop and look down at the grass. If they had been lucky the vibrations had made worms come up to the surface. Then the dance continued, feet moving and shoulders dancing from side to side. I didn't know they did this. I so wanted to set it to music; "Riverdance" would fit nicely.

Oakley Wood Crematorium

The past few months have seen a lot of work finalising the designs for the improvement work, tweaking the layouts and determining the final details of car parking spaces and arrangements. There have also been some essential changes to the programming of the work to reduce the disruption to bereaved families. If you've been on site recently you may have noticed that some work on the trees that needed removing/ pruning has been largely completed, and some 'marking out' has taken place. The work to convert the old Lodge into offices has been completed and the new customer reception is looking excellent! We've also put up a notice board and will be using this to keep site visitors up to date with what's going on from week to week.

As for the rest of the project...

The main works will happen in two stages. The first stage will be to build the new car park near to the south chapel. During this phase, the south chapel will be closed but the north will remain open. Saying that, there will be a few days where the necessary work will be particularly noisy – services aren't being booked for these particular days as it won't be an ideal time for a funeral. At the same time, the old offices in the south chapel will be knocked through and turned into a larger waiting room.

The second phase will see the south chapel and new car park reopened, and the contractors moving to the north of the site to alter the existing car park and extend the north chapel. As with phase one, there will be a number of days where services will not be held, but the south chapel will otherwise remain open throughout.

All in all, the whole package is expected to be complete in the autumn of 2015 (October time).

What happens next?

The contractors for the main works (Kier Construction) will be moving onto site on Monday 12th Jan. The first week will be a gentle start to things, with site setup taking place and fences going up around where the new car park will be built near to the south chapel. From here, work begins to prepare the ground for the rest of the construction.

It's expected to take around 8 weeks to complete the works in the south before moving on to stage 2 of the project. During the works, the crematorium will remain open for visitors and anyone who wants to use the surrounding woodland as normal though work will, of course, be happening throughout.
