As mentioned in the last magazine, over the last six months the parish council has really turned its attention to the future, thinking about what our parish will look like in five, ten or even 20 years' time. A lot of the work we have undertaken this month has been focused in this direction. Resident Chris Harrison has agreed to work with the Parish Council in managing our Meadow Makeover plan. We have appointed a design consultant who will be liaising with Chris to ensure that all needs are included in the plan. Chris will be contacting community groups, schools and the sports and social club to understand requirements but please be patient it's in the very early stages. Before a decision is made there will be opportunities for all to see the proposals. Cllrs. Matthew Greene, Carol Gabbitas and Ray Bullen met with Warwick District Council officers including the Chief Executive, Chris Elliott, to discuss the country park. Mr. Elliott stressed in the meeting that he fully supports the country park. Councillors are concerned that the park is reducing in size as the developer locates space for SUD ponds and allotments, they are also concerned about the safety issues of placing SUD ponds in country parks. Mr. Elliott has liaised with the developer and arranged for the allotments to be relocated but unfortunately was unable to assist with the SUD pond. He is, however, seeking assurances about the safety issues raised by the Parish Council from the developer. £500 is being donated to the Church for the management of the churchyard. This should assist with keeping the churchyard

neat and tidy.

The working parties are still active and doing a wonderful job. We believe the Warwick Gates roundabouts are on the list. If you want to help please contact Cllr. Paul Whitwood.

We have asked our contractors to cut the grass more frequently to keep the parish looking smart. The new mower seems to be providing a 'much better cut' than the old one which is good news. The play area will be inspected shortly.

Residents will no doubt be aware that two of our dog waste bins are rotting. We have decided not to replace them as there are other bins close by. Please note that dog waste does not have to be placed in dog waste bins, but can be placed in any bins. This was a policy adopted by the District Council several years ago.

Accounts have been approved and details are available on the website. Section 137 funding for community groups will be advertised in the next edition
We are in the process of confirming a meeting with Bloor Developments regarding the flooding issues on Holt Avenue. Update will be given in the next edition or at the next Parish Council meeting.

We are pleased to report that Chris Harrison and Nicola Burke have been appointed as the Parish Council representatives for the St. Chad's Centre Trust. Cllr. Carol Gabbitas is our third representative; we remain grateful to all our Trustees, past and present, for the work they do advancing the interests of the whole community through the

operation of the Centre.

Following discussions with the Police and the District Council we have decided to purchase a camera in the hope that flytipping and dog fouling will reduce in this parish. We have the full support of the Police and the District Council. The District Council has assured us that they will follow up on offenders where we have evidence.

We have received a complaint from a resident regarding parking on footways and near the brow of the hill on Mallory Road. Please note that whilst we do not support inconsiderate parking this is not within the remit of the Parish Council. We ask residents to please bear in mind that our footways need to be kept clear for wheelchairs, pushchairs and mobility scooters. If they are not then it is a matter for the Police. Please dial 101 and report offenders. Parking near the brow of the hill could be brought to the attention of the Police or County Highways.

Our County Cllr. Les Caborn is finding out whether Wychwood Close will be resurfaced this year. He is also following up on the repairs to the potholes. We are hoping that the manhole cover on Oakley Wood Road has been repaired but, if not, please be assured that this is being pursued by Les. There seems to be some confusion as to whether it is a County Council responsibility or Severn Trent.

Finally, Cllrs. Cathy Herbert, Carol Gabbitas and Graham Leeke have been working very hard on producing a 'Welcome Pack' for our new residents and we are pleased to report that it is nearly finished. If you have moved into the parish recently please do contact the clerk who will arrange for a pack to be delivered to you.

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
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Veggie Voice

July

Sow Cabbage (Chinese/spring), kohl rabi, pak-choi, pea, radish, salads, turnip.

Grow Keep container plants and those with swelling pods/fruit evenly watered.

Shorten side-shoots of red/white currents, gooseberries, and wall-trained apples and pears to control vigour and encourage ripening.

August

Sow Cabbage (Chinese/spring), pakchoi, turnip, winter salads green manures for soil protection, such as crimson clover, mustard, phacelia

Grow Exclude light from celery stems by surrounding with newspaper and pulling up soil ('blanching')
Pot up rooted strawberry plants ('runners')
Take cuttings of herbs, e.g. rosemary, bay, hyssop

The Shed sells compost, canes, various feeds, lawn seed, growbags and other horticultural needs.

I have been selling bird seed, fat balls and other wild bird needs and due to people's requests I am now starting to sell pet foods through a new venture called Tachbrook Pet Supplies. I can provide almost anything to look after your pet from dogs, cats, birds, fish, rabbits etc. I can get most dog and cat foods along with small animal foods for rabbits, hamsters etc. Fish food by the pot, bag or kilo. Straw for your rabbit, sawdust for your hamster and dog chews from pigs ears, hooves etc. Bowls for food and water, toys to keep your pet happy or if you're thinking of taking up fish keeping then tanks or bowls. Most items are available to order and can be delivered to your door on a Friday if orders are received by Wednesday of the week. I have in stock cat and dog treats, sawdust for your hamsters, fish food for your koi and pond fish. A price list for general items will be available at the Shed or e-mail tachbrookpetsupplies@gmail.com to either enquire about what your interested in or for a price list. You can always visit the Shed on a Sunday to discuss your requirements.

The Shed is open on a Sunday morning between 10-12 I am also looking at opening on the Saturday afternoon of Tachfest for people to find out more about the Shed or Tachbrook Pet Supplies. As the year is moving on fast the Shed will close for the summer holidays from 23rd July until 3rd September this closure does not affect any pet requirements as these will be fulfilled throughout the summer months. 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
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



UBUS is 3 Years Old

The UBUS community transport service has been running for 3 years now. Previously known as Community Links, UBUS came into effect in June 2014 and since then an amazing 30,000 journeys have been made across the district by over 800 registered users.

UBUS is a ring and ride community transport service operating within Stratford District.



UBUS is available to anyone in the district who struggles to access public transport due to mobility issues, health problems or who lives in an area with no, or infrequent, public transport.

Passengers can travel between 9:30am and 2:30pm.

UBUS will collect passengers from their door, drop them off at their destination, pick up again at the agreed point and drop off back at home. Drivers can assist passengers to get on & off the bus and will help with up to 3 shopping bags or a trolley if necessary. All UBUS vehicles can accommodate a wheelchair.

Depending on where residents live in the district a single journey costs £2.10, £2.70 or £3.40. Return journeys £4.20, £5.40 or £6.80.

Residents living in an Orbit property are eligible for a £0.60 discount on their journey. Journeys need to be booked in advance. Passengers can book up to seven days in advance.

UBUS provides transport in different parts of the district on specific days.

- West of Stratford Operates on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays & Fridays
- East of Stratford Operates on Mondays, Wednesdays & Fridays
- South of Stratford Operates on Tuesdays, Wednesdays & Thursdays
- Stratford Town Operates on Mondays to Fridays
- Southam & Surrounding area Operates on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays

UBUS can be used to visit friends, attend social groups, leisure activities or go shopping. It cannot be used to attend medical appointments.

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

Anyone who attended our June meeting expecting to hear about lions, elephants and trapeze artists was quickly disillusioned by Jacqui Kirk's presentation. Jacqui traced the development of the new exciting experience of being airborne, from the first powered flight in a Kitty Hawk in 1903, the Wright Brothers in 1908. to

the involvement of the Royal Flying Corps (army) and Royal Naval Air Service (navy) in WW1. The two latter services worked quite separately from each other until they were

merged in



Albert Ball VC - who transferred to the RFC when he was 20 and triumphed in 43 successful missions before crashing to his death. Sadly 50% of recruits were killed in training

1918 to become the Royal Air Force.
Jacqui showed us pictures of fragile mono and biplanes in various stages of development - and their crashed remains. Flying was an exciting, pioneering opportunity, attracting young adventurous men who, with very little experience or training, took to the skies and experimented with aerodynamics to control and develop techniques to attack or defend against enemy aircraft — controlling a spin or looping the loop. We heard a recording of the dead-pan voice

exercises.

After the war what could these young enthusiasts do? Some worked on developments in the aircraft industry or as test pilots, others exploited ways in which flying could open a new era of research, exploration and enhance skills, such as aerial photography. Others were devoted to introduce flying to the general public – which brings us to Sir Alan Cobham and the title of our talk. Sir Alan was famous as a long-distance

aviator; he was the first person to fly from London to Cape town and back in 1926 and Australia and back in the same year (being awarded a knighthood by George V). It was his flying tours all across the UK to promote aviation to the public which became known affectionately as "Sir Alan Cobham's Flvina Circus". These National Aviation Days consisted of skilled pilots flying a range of single-seaters to airliners at venues ranging from regular airfields to just fields. Attractions included exciting aerobatics, formation flying, lessons in flying, a short flight costing 4/- (four shillings), and pistol shooting at balloons. The public loved them and attended in their thousands; bus companies provided transport and flying

replaced motors in the public imagination and ambition. Locally shows were held at a polo ground on Radford Road; a football field on Tachbrook Road, in Southam and the 'Courier' advertised the 'Circus' each vear from 1930-1935. In 1933 it was held at our village's very own airfield – Julius Bonniksen's Aerodrome in Harbury Lane. The Circuses ended before WWII: Bonniksen's Aerodrome was requisitioned and became an assembly and testing facility of Whitley bombers, employing 80 people. Our book 'Bishop's Tachbrook - Past & Present' (available at Tachbrook Stores @ £12) includes an interesting article on Bonniksen's Aerodrome.

In a moment they were down and onto it. The Magpie, noticing the action flew in and joined the throng, much to the annoyance of the other birds. Now, the Magpie was feeding its young and now had to compete with many other beaks. So, what could it do to maximize its chances? The Crow family is



known for their intelligence, a plan was "hatched". It put as much bread into its beak as quickly as possible then dashed down the garden and landed on the lawn. It buried the bread in the grass then flew back for more. The Magpie took a second load of bread to next-door's lawn and hid it in that grass. It flew back to the garage just in time to grab some more bread, which it flew off with having secured three loads of bread in a few seconds. It had done well, planning ahead and spur of the moment.

Just to say the Polecat I drove past that had been knocked down on the Banbury road was confirmed by Pete Beauchamp who also saw it. I've never seen a live one, or a dead one until then come to think of it.

Peregrines are nesting in the clock tower off the Parade again. Think it must be the third year. I've not seen them but I've heard their unmistakable bird of prey calls from up the tower. Surprised Leamington has so many Pigeons left. Maybe Peregrines don't hunt on their own doorstep.

It's really difficult to choose just eight pieces of music from all that you've heard in your life particularly if, like me, you are mainly an album aficionado. I apologise in advance for the omission of any Beatles, jazz or traditional folk music (all of which are well represented in my collection).

Elgar Cello Concerto (Jacqueline du Pré) [1965]

I heard this played live by Jacqueline du Pré (from the front row) in Swansea in 1967 and in made a lasting impression on me. It is, by some margin my favourite classical piece.

Make My Garden Grow (from Candide by Leonard Bernstein) [1974]

This show had a chequered history being written by Leonard Bernstein (with various collaborators) over the period 1956-1989. This is the closing piece of the show and is really life affirming. Listen to the chorus on the best sound system you can.

Sympathy For The Devil (Rolling Stones) [1968]

Rock music is supposed to be edgy and this certainly fits the bill. From my favourite Stones album (Beggars Banquet) and the opposite from the Summer of Love period it encompasses.

Albatross (Fleetwood Mac) [1975]

This is our song, which was confirmed by it being played (chosen at random by the operating theatre staff) at the moment of our son Luke's birth.

River (Joni Mitchell) [1971]

I am a huge Joni fan (although my wife cannot stand her) and could have chosen any number of tracks. This is from my favourite album of all (Blue).

Famous Blue Raincoat (Leonard Cohen) [1971]

We have all Leonard Cohen's albums (and his novels and poetry collections) and have seen him live a number of times. This is my favourite although I am still not sure what it means.

Last Thing On My Mind (Tom Paxton) [1964]

A great songwriter and performer Tom has probably sung this song at every performance since he wrote it. He is still performing and it still stands up today.

I am a big musical theatre fan and Sondheim is a master of the genre. It is difficult to single out a single piece but this heart felt song stands up well outside of the context of the show.

The choice of a luxury item is, by contrast, very easy. I would like a guitar, with a never-ending supply of strings (who knows I may even improve).

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Memories of Grinshill. By Alan Lewis

I was reading some time ago in the Parish Magazine about the building of the new Church Hall. It said that the new building was trimmed in Grinshill sandstone, which made me very interested as my Great Grandfather worked in the quarry there in the late 1800's and early 1900's.

He had a stone cottage towards the top of the sandstone ridge on Grinshill Hill and it overlooked the villages of Grinshill and Clive in central Shropshire. It was here that he brought up his ten children , all of whom lived to ripe old ages. His eldest child was my maternal Grandmother born in 1888. My Great Grandfather William (Bill) Davies was also known by his nickname of 'Derrick' Davies (or Davies the Derrick). This was not because his name was Derek but because he operated the derricks in the local quarry that lifted the pieces of stone for most of his working life of forty years.

The rock there has been quarried on and off since Roman times right up to the present day. Grinshill stone is a Triassic desert sandstone, that is it is between 252 million years old and 201 million years old, a time when Dinosaurs first appeared towards the end of the period. Grinshill stone is described in The Architectural Guide as the preeminent building stone of Shropshire. It has been used in many buildings including Shrewsbury Railway Station and Welsh Bridge over the river Severn in Shrewsbury. Grinshill sandstone was also used to make the lintels and door surrounds of Number 10 Downing Street and also during the building of Chequers.

When he retired Great Granddad Bill went to live in a large brick house "The Manse" in Hadnall a few miles from his former cottage. I remember him having a walking stick made from a Zulu war club called a 'knobkerrie', a souvenir of his time in the Army. He was very fit as even in his eighties he cycled his heavy black bike the seven miles from Hadnall into Shrewsbury to collect his pension and have a pint.
