When the roof falls in

It's never easy to cope when something awful happens. When you receive bad news you run through a gamut of emotions. Anger is there at the forefront and, it seems to me, these days, we need someone or something to direct our anger towards someone must be to blame.

After anger we might experience sorrow, sadness that things are different now, they won't be the same because of what has happened. Perhaps someone you trusted has let you down; will your relationship survive, why did they behave in a particular way.

Sometimes hopelessness sets in, How will you survive this? What is going to happen next? Or maybe relief that it could have been worse, the sun still rose the next day, even if covered by clouds and friends rallied around.

I think I went through all of the above after the lead was stolen off the church roof. I was angry that it had happened and I was livid when the thieves came back the next night to finish off the job! Who were these people, how could they do this to a place of worship. I was struck by the words of a guy in the village, one of our Muslim friends, who said, "Being a man of faith I know how sacred, safe and important a place of

worship is to a community." (Thank you Tim). His words made me realise that these people had violated my sacred space, our sacred space and that made me very angry. Anger is okay, even Jesus got angry when he overturned the tables of the money lenders in the temple, I was in good company!

I was also very sad. By Tuesday, it had really hit me what had happened and I cried. I felt it was somehow my fault, this had happened on my watch, what more could I have done. I am very grateful to my lovely son, Adam and Anne Allen for feeding me, making me cups of tea and giving me big hugs! Those hugs were needed on Wednesday too and quite a number of people at the Community Coffee morning duly obliged! Yes, I am still sad, but I know I'm not alone.

So to the feeling of hopelessness, how are we going to raise the money needed to repair our beautiful church? Because of the wonderful people of this village that feeling of hopeless didn't last for long. You all made me feel that this wasn't just my problem or even the problem of our worshipping community, this was a Tachbrook problem and the people of Tachbrook, young and old, long time villagers or those who've just moved in to the new estates, would tackle it

together. The outpouring of love, concern and offers of help were overwhelming. The PCC Of St Chad's was wonderful and Rod, Ray and Mervyn were at church to meet our new architects and to listen to what they had to say. Con Buttle, climbed up onto the roof and made it as watertight as he could, and hundreds of you turned out on Saturday June 8th to support the Fete even if the weather wasn't brilliant. There was over £370 in the buckets, which has been put into a restricted account to only be used for the roof and hopefully, we have topped £4,000. for the rest of the Fete, which is great news. Other people from the village have offered to organise more fundraising events; Phil at the Leopard has offered to organise a gala dinner, which should be fun and Kirsty Anderson-Shearsby and Lucy Godfrey have organised an Auction Of Promises at The Sports and Social Club on 21st July, 2pm start!



I personally can not express how much this has all meant to me. Thank you all so much for your love and support. We have a big hill to climb but you have all given me hope, helped me realise that this is a great place to live and that it is a privilege to be your vicar. I'm sure with hard work, love and prayer, St Chad's will be restored to its former glory.

I'd like to finish with a prayer for our church and our community.

Lord, thank you for those who first heard your call to build a church in Bishop's Tachbrook, dedicated to St. Chad, many centuries ago so that this community might hear the good news and receive the healing love of God.

We thank you for those who have cared for this church over the years, and for all who have given to the upkeep of this building. Today we especially thank you for all those who have generously given to the fund to repair the roof of St Chad's and to those who will give in the months ahead.

May God bless Bishop's Tachbrook and shield and defend every life here. May the angels of God guard every home and workplace so that together we may live in peace with God and with one another. Amen

Parish Council News

Summer holidays are almost here and, here's to hoping we get some sustained good weather! In the last few weeks I've seen rabbits, foxes, a badger, two deer and a baby tawny owl, a reminder of how much wildlife we have on our doorstep. I've also seen a heck of a lot of big spiders (!!)

Hopefully the establishment of the country park will protect and further promote wildlife (and my particular hope is that we can find a way to encourage any sort of wildlife that eats big spiders!)

In June we held the monthly Parish Council meeting at Heathcote Primary School. This is a great venue for holding such a meeting and, while it was disappointing that no residents chose to attend the meeting, we are keen to continue to hold some of the meetings going forward at the school and other

locations so as to ensure residents have access to the PC on a regular basis.

While, at present, we remain 7, we are pleased to report that 5 residents have come forward for our 2 vacancies on the Parish Council. The earliest we can co-opt residents to the Parish Council is at our July meeting and so we look forward to announcing the names of the two co-opted members after that date

A grant request has been submitted to the Police and Crime Commissioner's fund for £25,000 towards a crossing on Oakley Wood Road. This need was identified at our 2 events held at the end of last year and beginning of this year and has been regularly raised by passionate local residents.

Thanks to the Play Area Working Party we have secured a £10,000 grant towards play equipment

from the National Lottery. Installation has been delayed due to the District Council requiring a planning application; this has been submitted: however, we understand there to be quite a backlog in the WDC planning department we continue to raise this with our District Councillors and hope that the matter will be resolved as soon as possible.

We understand the application for the Primary School, Secondary School and 150 homes within our Parish has now been submitted – residents should have access to the planning documents in the near future (although please note the comments above in respect of the backlog in the WDC planning department).

I'm waiting to hear back from my letter to the South Warwickshire Clinical Commissioning Group re the strain on GP provision within the village area of the Parish. County Cllr. Les Caborn is going to chase up the response on our behalf.

Additionally, I've written to all parties involved in the long running funds due back from Sharba Homes following their appeal process relating to their planning application – we have made clear that the Parish Council will take legal action to recover the debt should the payment not be received by the middle of July.

Thank you to residents who raised the problem of accessing the new path from the Oakley Meadows development due to the kissing gate. This has now been converted into a "normal gate" – thanks to Cllr. Leigh Carter for organising this work.

Cllr. Carter is also responsible for traffic and road safety and he is working hard with the County Council, Police and new leader of the Speedwatch Team to try and identify a location on Harbury Lane for a

CSW session. This will be scheduled once the Police respond. We have also requested that the County Council look at ways to improve the Banbury Road/Mallory Road junction - in the short term the Chairman is working with County Cllr. Les Caborn to hopefully arrange for the tree (which blocks the view from the right at that junction) to be cut back.

The initial Neighbourhood Plan consultation has finished. The NP committee had a lively meeting in June at which they discussed the responses, including suggestions by developers to build on new sites around the village. Allowing this may fund projects such as improving the junction onto Banbury Road, providing a car park in the village and acquiring land to add to the Country Park. A mixture of views exist on the Parish Council and NP committee in respect of these thoughts and have agreed to reflect on the

matters. Nothing would be undertaken without proper public consultation.

Thanks to the two residents who have volunteered to manage the new allotments on the Oakley Meadows development. Our solicitors are still working on lodging the legal documents at Land Registry.

Seating in our bus shelters has been requested by a resident; the County Council has advised us to seek advice before pursuing this. We have asked a company that specialises in repairs and adaptations to bus shelters to look at the shelter near Holt Avenue.

The Warwick Gates noticeboard will disappear shortly to be refurbished. Work will also take place on the noticeboard near the BMX track.

We hope that everyone manages to find time to have an enjoyable summer break.







History Club Outing to the Edgehill Battle Site

The Group met our guide, Steve Barker, in Radway village, just below Edge Hill, where the first major encounter of the English Civil War began. Disagreements between the King and Parliament had led to the declaration of war.

The Royalist army was commanded by King Charles I and the Parliamentarians by the Earl of Essex. There were about 12,000 soldiers on each side. comprising of infantry, cavalry and a number of cannons. The Royalist army marched from Shrewsbury and having out-manoeuvred Essex deployed on Edge Hill Ridge on the morning of the October 23, 1642. The Parliamentarians occupied the ground south-east of Kineton. The Royalist descended the ridge during the late morning and positioned themselves in Radway fields.

Our first stop was the

old church grave yard (church demolished 1880) that, it is believed, has only one grave relating to the Civil War, that of Elizabeth Heritage, who was perhaps ministering to the injured in the first aid tent and who died some years later.



We then moved on to the new church (1888) where there were a number of displayed artefacts and costume mannequins and an inter-active kiosk that showed short films photos and other information (well worth a visit). We then moved behind the new church to view the battlefield and Steve pointed out the position of the opposing troops and in the distance we could see the tower of Kineton Church

Steve then went on to explain that after an initial artillery exchange the Royalist cavalry charged and drove the flanks of the parliament troops back towards Kineton. But then the parliamentary infantry troops drove the king's men back towards Edge Hill. The infantry of both armies now fought a fierce battle. By late afternoon both armies were exhausted and short of ammunition and fighting ended as night fell. In total about 1,500 men may have lost their lives with more wounded on both sides.

The battle had only lasted a few hours. The Earl of Essex retired to Warwick Castle and the royalist army eventually marched south with the intension of taking London. This it failed to do as Essex and his army got there first.

Our third stop was on the roadside looking across the field towards the site of King Leys Barn. It was there that the sons of King Charles I, the boy princes Charles and James, were sent for safety.

During the battle the Banner Royal was captured from Sir Edmund Verney, though, on his refusal to surrender it, his hand was cut off to get it. The banner was later



recaptured by Lieutenant Colonel Welch supported by Captain Smith. Verney died of his injuries and it is said he haunts the grounds of the battle fields looking for his body, which was never identified. The only thing they found was his severed hand in his gauntlet. That is now buried in the Verney family burial vault at Middle Claydon, Buckinghamshire.

The fourth stop was the roadside memorial stone where they remember the dead of the battle. The dead of the ordinary soldiers were all buried in a mass grave in the middle of a field close by.

Having finished our tour of the battle site, the party finished the day by going to nearby Upton House for lunch and the opportunity to visit both the house and its gardens. We were thankful that the weather remained dry during our day out.
