During the past few weeks my Facebook and Twitter feeds seem to have been full of friends going to the cinema with their families to see the new live version of Disney's Beauty and the Beast. They all seemed to love it!

It strikes me that like many of our folk tales and fairy stories, it has a theme of redemption; lives changed through love and acceptance. The Beast suffers the consequences of his selfishness and arrogance, but is transformed by Belle's love and persistence, despite how badly he has treated her. It's a theme we humans seem to need in our stories — I'm sure you can think of many others, ancient and modern where people are changed through love.

Of course from my Christian point of view this is the overarching story I read throughout the bible – God wants to redeem the world, and every human person. God longs for us to have an abundant, joyful and fulfilling life!

Time and again characters in the bible who seem, like us all at times, to be pretty hopeless cases are enabled to do amazing things – vain, arrogant Joseph saves a nation and his own family from famine – impetuous, gung-ho Peter comes through denial and abandonment of Jesus to lead the early church and so many more.

The message for me is that if we share unconditional love and acceptance – which through God's grace, has been

given to each of us - then, we can change the world one broken person at a time.

Of course such grace, such love costs — we leave ourselves open to betrayal, to pain, to being ignored and utterly unappreciated and taken for granted — it cost Jesus all this and so much more as we have just remembered over Easter. But ask anyone whose life has been changed by someone loving them unconditionally — it is an amazing way to unlock a person from the prison of thinking they are useless and unloved by the world.

During the 10 days between Ascension Day and Pentecost, (May 25th to the 4th June) the Archbishops of Canterbury and York have asked all Christians to pray for our Nation focusing on the Lord's Prayer and especially the words "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done."

The Archbishops and other Christian leaders who are joining this venture hope that all Christians will deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ and have the confidence to share the Good News with others. Their prayer is that many will respond to the call of Jesus Christ, will come to know the amazing grace of God and so follow Him as disciples, to live out the Gospel and to seek God's Kingdom from day to day, to love unconditionally.

At St Chad's there will be a 7:30am service on Ascension Day (May 25th) followed by bacon buns, tea and coffee in the St Chad's Centre. On Saturday 27th

May the church will be open from 7am to 7pm to give people the opportunity to pray. If you haven't been to church for a while, why not take this as a chance to pop in and pray, maybe light a candle.

From 10am in the St Chad's there will be a opportunity to spend time in meditative prayer by walking a labyrinth. This is an ancient way of praying The **Labyrinth** represents a journey to our own center and back again out into the world.

We will complete this day of prayer by sharing a supper together in the St Chad's Centre, beginning at 7pm. All are welcome.

During the week beginning the May 29th the church will be open for prayer an each evening at 8pm we will use the ancient service of Compline.

On Saturday 3rd of June there will be Messy Church for Pentecost in the St Chad's Centre beginning at 3pm and on Pentecost Sunday we will celebrate the church's birthday with a Family communion service, birthday cake and wine!

Hopefully, if you join with our worship you will meet with Christ and come to know of his love.

It's a tale as old as time.

Walking a Labyrinth at St Chad's

As part of the Archbishop of Canterbury's call to pray for our world, our nation and ourselves, we, at St Chad's will be spending 12 hours in prayer on Saturday 27th May. The church will be open from 7am to 7pm and from 10am there will be the opportunity to walk a labyrinth in the St Chad's Centre. Walking a Labyrinth is a journey. In the Middle Ages the labyrinths were used as a way for people to participate in a pilgrimage without the expense or time required in actually going to another place. A labyrinth is a patterned path, usually circular in form, and is used as a walking meditation or spiritual practice. A **labyrinth's** walkway is arranged in such a way that the participant moves back and forth across the circular form through a series of curves, ending at the labyrinths's heart or centre.

Each person chooses how to walk the Labyrinth; the pace you walk – some walk faster in and then slower on the way out; others try slowing down their mind by slower walking but it is up to each individual. When you reach the centre of the Labyrinth many people pause for a while. It is good to be able to take things at your own pace. When you are ready continue on your journey out of the labyrinth.

Please do come and try this. Many people who do not attend church find the labyrinth a good experience. If you have any questions then do contact Rev Elaine.



County Council elections will take place on 4th May with our new boundary now in place (see April magazine). This is a chance for you to have your say on who represents our area on many areas such as health, social care, education and highways; please therefore do take the time to yote.

Bloor Developments have stabilised the embankment on Oakley Wood Road allowing our contractor to start fencing. By the time you read this we hope that the fence has been erected. We do apologise to the allotment holders for any inconvenience this may have caused and thank the manager of the allotments for working with us on this matter.

The planning application for 150 homes on Oakley Wood Road has been refused by the District Council. This was welcome news for this Parish Council who campaigned strongly on this matter given the sense of feeling within the Parish.

Councillors are actively trying to move forward on providing benches and a bus shelter for Warwick Gates. Projects such as outdoor gym equipment and a storage facility on the meadow are also progressing. The meadow cycleway looks to be finished later this year and it is hoped that the road improvements on Oakley Wood Road will be started shortly. The country park is another project that the Parish Council now intend to take forward and we have made the District Council aware of our desire to proceed and engage with them on this at the

earliest opportunity.

The April Parish working party saw a good turnout allowing for a good clear up of some of the green spaces on the junction of Holt Avenue and Mallory Road — thanks again to all those who volunteer their time to make our Parish a more attractive place to residents and visitors alike. Sadly, some of the tasks included remedial works to small areas recently blighted by graffiti; we would encourage anyone who witnesses any such unpleasant behaviour to contact the local police.

The end of year (to 31 March) accounts will be finalised shortly and should be available on the website in the next month.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Thursday, 18th May where we will appoint our Chairman for next year.

Well Spring doesn't hang around on the doorstep waiting to be asked in, she barges through the door, opens the curtains and puts the kettle on. All life responds, birds sing before dawn and nest sites are quickly found. If the singing sounds romantic its not - its a song of threat, "I hear you, I know you are over there, I'm here, back off!" the hedgerows are clothed in lush green leaves in no time, grass grows, Wood Anemones, Lesser Celandines and Dandelions run riot, everything jostling for space and light. Then, the magic carpet of Bluebells open as they have done throughout time. Spring has sprung and holds out a hand for Summer.

Just outside the window is a Rose bush and by early April it has Greenfly. Two female House Sparrows search among the leaves looking at the undersides, picking off the juicy morsels. Meanwhile, as they work, just a few yards away sits a male House Sparrow chirping his beak off and swaying from side to side. He's showing off and trying to impress. The females continue to eat.

I was half way up Edgehill; behind me were a couple of Hereford Bulls. After filling themselves with grass it was time to sit down, to regurgitate and digest. No sooner were they down and chomping, eight Jackdaws flew in and landed on them. They searched the bull's backs for insect pests. The bulls were well used to this and seemed to enjoy a beak massage win, win.

With a couple of easy winters this may be a good year for butterflies. I've seen Brimstones, Tortoiseshells, a couple of Peacocks, a Speckled Wood and a Little Blue.

Driving back from Moreton Morrell, it was still light as two male Roe Deer crossed the road in front of me. I slowed down to give them time, lovely dark brown and creamy rumps and short antlers. They pushed through a hedge; one of them had trouble with

the steep wire fence. It managed to clear it. They both stopped and looked back at me as I slowly drove past.

On 15 April three Swallows chittered and chattered over Tachbrook with their budgie-like call- so good to see them sounding full of joy. On the 17th there were ten House Martins criss-crossing the steep field in Wasperton. They have flown over elephant and wildebeest in Africa now its cows and sheep over our meadows. This is where they will have their young.

And so it all goes round again thank God.



- Raining in my Heart by Buddy Holly and The Crickets from the album 'The very best of Buddy Holly'
 My dad died when I was young. My step brother took his role and he was a Buddy Holly fan. This reminds me of him and I still can sing it word for word.
- 2. **English Folk Song Suite** by Ralph Vaughan Williams
 At Boarding school we had to listen to classical music on Sundays, despite this I still ended up liking some! This also counts as my folk and classic pick.
- **3. London's Burning** by The Clash from the album 'The Clash' *The lead singer was my best friend at school*
- **4. Preachin The Blues** PT 1&2 by Son House from the album 'King of the Delta Blues I saw him with the above lead singer at Fairfield Halls Croydon. He had to be carried on stage. His music was sublime
- 5. **Safari Ya Malindi** by Kafri Mweane from the album 'Christmas in Machakos' Kate and I taught at a small school in the hills above Machakos Kenya. I was their two and a half years, Kate for one and a half. The jangly guitar sound, heard in many African countries, really gets the toes tapping!
- **6. Wedding song** by Bob Dylan from the album 'Planet Waves I guess a lot of couples have 'their' song and this is ours. We started listening to it in Kenya.

Maurice Heritage is a guide at *Snowshill Manor*, a Cotswold NT house near Broadway. His talk in April was impressive with his clear delivery, wealth of knowledge about its quirky collection and his love and enthusiasm for the place. In 821 it was the property of Winchcombe Abbey, but following the Dissolution in 1539 it passed to Henry VIII and various royal owners and tenants. In each century the house was extended and re-modelled and finally purchased by Charles Paget Wade in 1919.

century. He restored the derelict Snowdon Manor to house his vast collection of 22,000 objects and he lived in a small cottage behind the Manor (also crammed with "collectables"). He designed the garden into small "rooms" with terraces, pools, a model village and railway. There are 22 rooms in the house, each devoted to a particular type of article from around the world. Clocks however are in many rooms and are all set at a different time: the visitors can enjoy the sound of the different chimes



Charles Wade was an architect, craftsman, poet, artist, illustrator and heir to the family fortune. His great passion was to collect items that were unusual, well made and becoming rare in the fast-changing fashions of the industrial 20th

(but resort to their watches to see the time). There are beautiful clothes, elaborately embroidered textiles, delicate carvings in bone (made by French prisoners-of-war), musical instruments, fire buckets, bicycles - tracing their history from the hobby horse to the two-



wheeled variety with pedals - carriages, prams and push-chairs (including an upmarket variety in the design of a hansom cab). Wade would not allow bright lights in his rooms; originally lit by candles, they were eventually replaced by electric candle bulbs. The threatening sight of Samurai warriors in a dark room is eerie and the memory has stayed with me since my first visit 31 years ago, when the gloomy displays were haphazard and dusty. But the NT has improved the layout and restored the

gardens, proving a pleasant view of the landscape. Wade was an eccentric, gifted man, but not a recluse; his estate was visited by famous names in literature like J B Priestly and Vita Sackville-West. The generous bequest of his home and collection to the National Trust in 1951 has given pleasure to many and is an invaluable source of information for international social historians. He died in 1955.

It was a clear day, with sunset at 11:00pm but the ice was different, it was freezing immediately the ship had passed through it. Everyone was suddenly made aware of a problem in the cabins. Everyone was told to pack due to an underwater ice spear puncturing the hull of the ship. They were told it was being sorted out. A Mayday signal was sent and picked up in Rome. The rescue was coordinated by Falmouth Coast Guard because there were 24 Brits on board. Abandon Ship was called. Everyone got into the lifeboats which, when dropped into the water, flooded everyone. After over four hours of sitting in freezing, wet, silence a light was seen which turned out to be a diverted cruise liner. After getting on board a whiteout occurred in which all could have died but they all survived.

On eventually arriving in Buenos Aries, and knowing the drug to help her husband was unavailable in the UK, Georgie went to the press who had been following the rescue. She explained her husband's situation and, within a few weeks, the drug was made available. It was an amazing and riveting talk.
