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Raising the roof By Revd. Elaine Scrivens

A couple of weeks before writing this letter, Bishop's Tachbrook school had its SIAMS inspection (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools). The purpose of the inspection is how we are doing as a church school. We don't know the result yet but I do know that the staff work so hard to ensure each child reaches his or her full potential. The vision of the school is based on a saying of Jesus, "Love our neighbour as yourself" and this is achieved through the Christian values at the heart of the school.

During the inspection, I and a group of governors were asked by the inspector, "Where do you see God at work in this school?" There were many examples we could give of children being kind, the buddy system between Years 6 and Reception, where the older pupils help and mentor their buddies, of the school prayer written with help from the children, how the children lead services in church. The list was endless and it set me thinking about where we see the work of God in St Chad's and in our community.

Just over six months ago we had the lead from our roof stolen and we were left with what seemed an almost impossible task of raising the money to replace it but nothing is impossible with God and the good will and help of our local community. Over £2000 was raised at an auction of promises, £8,000 was given by L&Q group, £2,500 by Rick & Fiona Hunt at Soma Services Ltd, over £1000 raised by the parents and children of BT C of E Primary school, £1,500 raised at an open garden event, local churches giving us money and local individuals giving donations ranging from £100 to £1,000. Gosh, this was most definitely God at work in our community!

Thanks to this wonderful effort and also a generous grant from the Croft Trust we now have the money and the various permissions needed to begin work. We have chosen our contractors and our architects are hoping work will commence soon. The roof will be replaced by terne-coat steel, which looks very similar to lead but cannot be removed as easily. Thank you so much to all who have contributed to this huge success story! Do come along to St Chad's on March 1st when we will give thanks at our Civic Service for our amazing community.

Of course, during this time we have still had to pay for the running costs of the church and I must admit we are struggling. We are about to launch a Parish Giving Scheme where people can donate to St Chad's by Direct Debit. Every penny helps and if you want to see a thriving and active church in the village then please do consider joining the scheme when it is launched. There will be more details in next months magazine.

Every penny we spend at St Chad's has to be raised by us as a congregation and a community. I am so grateful to the generosity of so many but it can't just end with the roof being fixed. This past couple of months our boiler has cost us over £1,000 to repair. At the end of last month we had £270 in our current account. We owe £16,000 to the diocese from last year's parish share and haven't started paying the £33,000 we need to pay this year. Please do consider giving to your parish church on a regular basis to ensure the survival of St Chad's now and in the future.

Let me finish on an upbeat note, thanks to our wonderful community we will raise the roof on St Chad's. Come and celebrate with us on March 1st at 10am, with children from our school performing, Archdeacon Sue Fields preaching and cake and Prosecco in the St Chad's Centre after the service!

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Parish Council News By Matt Greene

We live in an age of both scepticism and cynicism; the "post-truth" nature of our public discourse means reason and facts have taken a backseat to reaction and emotion. Fuelled by a 24hr news cycle, social media and the reduction of debate (spectated or otherwise) being two or more people each shouting their views at each other in an uncompromising fashion. The "middle ground" has all but disappeared, those who are not unquestionably for a course of action are seen as being against it (and viceversa!) meaning balanced views are roundly rejected.

The danger of such a culture is the suppression of ideas, the trampling of the minority and the hesitation of many to propose a new path – when they know that people will attack and teardown new concepts with little more purpose than that of a school bully.

I therefore found it refreshing to see that, in the District Council, cross-party unity has formed over the issue of significantly (in proportional terms) increasing the council tax we pay to WDC each year (a Band D will increase from c£167 to c£224, £52 of which will go into a ring-fenced Climate Action Fund). Now this increase, along with the "inflation-busting" increases in council tax of the County Council and the Police and Crime Commissioner (as well as a very modest rise in the Parish Precept) will hit people who are just about managing. Tax rises are never popular and, as things stand, there will be a referendum on 7 May to decide whether to accept the Climate Action Fund portion of the rise.

It's not clear what the outcome of such a referendum would be (nor is this article attempting to infer what the outcome "should be"); however, I would praise the District Councillors for three different things –

- Their willingness to work together on a matter they consider to be a priority for our district and the world.
- Their willingness to grasp the nettle and be honest about what they believe is necessary to achieve what they believe.
- Their willingness to take a risk of rejection at the ballot box by pushing for what might ultimately be an unpopular tax rise knowing it will be put to a referendum.

No doubt there will be a chance to engage with some of the district councillors on this matter in the coming weeks; let's hope that such engagement, across the district, is conducted in an open-minded way.

The Parish Council hosted a public question and answer session on 3rd

February with Mr. Philip Seccombe, the Police and Crime Commissioner. Mr. Seccombe was joined by Sergeant Danielle Bristow and PCSO Amy Paull; both from the Safer Neighbourhood Team. We believe the evening was a success and thank Mr. Seccombe and the Police for attending. The Parish Council will be trying to arrange for regular attendance at Parish Council meetings by the Police and this will be advertised on our noticeboards, website and Facebook.

The long awaited new noticeboard has been installed on Warwick Gates. One side will be for Parish Council news with the other for voluntary community groups. If you wish to display any information please contact the clerk.

The Parish Council has applied for funding for a bus shelter on Harbury Lane near Heathcote Park. We should hear very shortly if we have been successful.

The trees on Oakley Wood Road have finally been partly felled. This was necessary as branches were falling. Several fell onto the fence around the allotments. Our builders will be repairing this fence shortly. The area around the trees will be given much needed tender loving care by our Working Party and the chippings will be levelled. If you wish to join the voluntary working party please contact Cllr. Keith Wellsted. taking place in March. Please look out for the notices. We have been notified that the planned secondary school will go ahead along with the additional 150 homes – we will keep residents updated on timeframes.

District Cllr. Norris has made officers aware of the lack of bins on our new developments. If the development has been adopted by the Council then bins should appear shortly. If not you may have to wait several months before they are able to address this issue.

Cllr. Carter has been given information relating to the speed of vehicles on Harbury Lane. He is analysing this data and will then pass recommendations to the Parish Council. A site has now been risk assessed on Harbury Lane for Community Speedwatch. If you are able to help please contact our Community Speedwatch Co-Ordinator, Mr. Luke Berry.

Additionally, talks are underway between the County Council, AC Lloyd and Cllr. Carter for traffic calming measures on Mallory Road. The measures will be near the new development; however, more traffic calming measures are also planned for Oakley Wood Road - residents close to the proposed works will be made aware of the plans.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on 12th March when we will be joined by the Chairman of Warwick District Council.


Nature Page By Steve Harvey

I heard the first Chaffinch in the same garden. I've heard the first Chaffinch for the last four years. Lots of things are a bit early this year like the Blackbird that's been singing in Sainsbury's carpark. Not to be out done ASDA now has its own singing Blackbird. I wonder if it's a little 'cheeper' there!

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Looking back Excerpts from past magazines

SCHOOL NOTES from March 1965

At the time of the formal opening in 1963 the point was made that our school was founded by private subscription as a day school in 1765. Those interested in the school and its history were reminded also that its foundation was made possible because of the generosity of a number of local people, principle amongst whom was Sir William Bagot, (Baronet), who donated the land and garden, provided the school and school house and subscribed £50 of the original endowment.

Two points emerge from the foregoing: the first is that 1965 marks the bicentenary of the school's existence, and the second demonstrates the interest shown by the Bagot family at that earlier date, in the well being of this village and its children.

Since our move into the new buildings a number of parents have suggested that the institution of a badge would make more complete the uniform we have adopted and this provides a possible point of correlation between the school's bicentenary and the Bagot family.

For this reason, after an earlier abortive flirtation with the Landor family, enquiries are being set in train to investigate the possibility of using for our badge, a design based on the Bagot family coat-of-arms to be adopted by our school this year, possibly about the 21st June, the commemorative date of the formal opening in 1963, or more probably, on a date near the 5th November, on which date in 1962, the school took over the new premises. 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News from Heathcote Primary School

Well I cannot believe that a whole half term has gone already and we are well on the way to spring. Even though it has been a very wet and windy term there are signs of new life everywhere. Our Reception children have been exploring the surrounding areas around our school on their nature walks. They have seen daffodils beginning to break the surface, snowdrops bobbing their heads, buds beginning to form on the trees and a very friendly robin followed them as they skipped along. The daffodils the parish council kindly planted for us at the front of the school are starting to break through the surface and this will add some real colour to our site.

Last month I shared with you some of the exciting things we were planning for January and February and we now have a wonderful willow dome in our forest school area. The Friends of Heathcote Primary School raised funds for this and the children helped Willow Bank (living willow specialists) install it. 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Bishop's Tachbrook

The Bishop [of Chester] holds 7 hides in Tachbrook. It is in the Tremelow Hundred. There is arable land for 12 ploughs. The lordship has 2 ploughs. [The inhabitants consist of:] 9 slaves;11 villein families; a priest; and 7 borderer families. They have 9 ploughs. There are 2 water mills, valued at 12s 8d. There are 12 acres of pasture land. The value at the time of King Edward [the Confessor] was £3, now £7. As much when acquired. This land belongs to St Chad's Church [Lichfield Cathedral].


The Count [of Meulan] holds in Tachbrook 7 and three quarter hides. He derived it from [his father,] Roger [de Beaumont]. There are 6 ploughs of arable land, with the lord having half a plough. [The inhabitants consist of:] 5 villein families and 7 borderer families. They have 3 ploughs. There are 12 acres of pasture land. At the time of King Edward [the Confessor] the value of the manor was 60 shillings, it is now valued at 40 shillings. [In 1066] the land was held freehold by Baldwin.
