#### You know I need someone to help

This morning I celebrated Holy Communion in my garden. As you might have guessed I'm writing this in the afternoon of Easter Sunday. This past week has been really strange for me. Normally Holy Week is one of the busiest weeks of the year as a vicar. I try to hold a service every day. On Maundy Thursday I attend the Cathedral for a Chrism Mass, this involves, Bishop's, priests and deacons renewing their ordination vows and lay workers recommitting themselves to their work in the church. Oil is also blessed which is used throughout the diocese for baptisms, confirmation and anointing the sick and dying. In the evening there is a service commemorating the Last Supper, the church is then stripped of all ornamentation, and we sit and watch with Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane. This brings us to Good Friday during which there is a three hour service from 12 till 3 pm. Holy Saturday is spent cleaning the church, the flower ladies come in and make the church beautiful and there was to be a craft afternoon for the children. Easter Sunday is always a joyous service where we remember the Risen Jesus.

This year has been very different. The church building is closed but the people of God who are the "real church" still need spiritual nourishment and so I set about creating a YouTube channel and a Facebook Group "St

Chad's church Bishop's Tachbrook". Each evening I recorded an ancient night prayer called Compline and was very grateful to Kieron Howe for singing for us and then uploaded it. On Maundy Thursday I "attended" a Chrism Mass, and renewed my ordination vows on line, thanks to the Bishop, Christopher, and the technical talents of many at Coventry Cathedral. On Good Friday I uploaded a meditation, looking at the crucifixion through the eyes of Jesus' mother, Mary and in the evening I uploaded a Tenebrae service. Which brings me to today and celebrating communion in my garden and decorating a cross for outside St Chad's. A very different year but one in which I believe I have grown as a Christian and as a priest. I've definitely stepped outside my comfort zone.

What has been surprising and really wonderful is the number of people who have accessed these service either via Facebook, YouTube and today for the first time, Instagram! Many more than would have attended services in St Chad's.

Wherever we are and whatever we've done as Christians this year, it has perhaps made us think "outside" the box. I know for me it has emphasised something I needed to hear and that is that the walls of our buildings, if we allow ourselves to be constrained by

them, limit the message we share.

As Christians we've so often acted as if our faith is only valid if we do it in our 'proper building'. We've often acted as if we have the authority on how to worship, what exactly to believe about every doctrine of the church, who is welcome and who is not. This year we have been called back to focus on the basic and most important and transformative message of all, 'Jesus lived, died and is Risen!'

This is our faith, Nothing else matters... So from whatever church or place we might come, whatever opinions we might hold and whatever the future may bring, that news, 'Jesus is risen' assures us that he is with us always. It assures us that there is no darkness we cannot face with him on our side because he has been there and conquered it.

This year we don't have to choose which is 'our church'. We don't have to drive or walk past several others to get to the right one for us. We don't have to go to the one with the best preacher or the most comfortable seats. It doesn't matter what hymns are sung, whether babies are baptised, who receives the bread and wine at communion, who is welcome and who is not, because love has won the day... God is love and the only choice we are called to make this year is whether we can say and know in our hearts, 'lesus is risen'. For me this has been a transformative message. Yes life is difficult, many people are

suffering but we are all in this together and God is in the midst of it all.

As we move on from Easter and into the weeks and months ahead may we continue to work together, may our community continue to take care of the vulnerable and as our Queen said in her first Easter message, "We know that coronavirus will not overcome us. As dark as death can be – particularly for those suffering with grief – light and life are greater. May the living flame of the Easter hope be a steady guide as we face the future."

#### **Parish Council News**

When days fall into a repetitive pattern, time can accelerate - this explains why, when travelling on holiday (to a new destination) the first few days are long with so many experiences; however, as the holiday progresses, we develop a routine and time seems to speed up. Memories overlay day upon day and, whilst time is linear, when we look back, it appears to have accelerated.

The danger of this lockdown is that we do fall into a routine; every day the same, meaning that, for those of us fortunate to be in the "inconvenienced" category (rather than faced with the hardship of the health or wellbeing implications of the virus), yes it will seem to be over quicker but that we will miss some of the opportunities that circumstance is giving us to slow down and mindfully engage with this part of our lives - an effect exacerbated by the continuous feeling of the need to look ahead to 'when this is over'. A challenge I will set myself in May will be to approach the restrictions with more of an acceptance (rather than endurance) mentality.

New legislation allowed us to hold our first virtual Parish Council meeting. Fortunately, with the embracing of new technology introduced by Cllr. Brewster last year, this was less of a change/ burden for us than it will have been for many Parish Councils around the country. Of course, we had some teething problems, but I'm sure we will

learn to utilise this new way of working quite effectively - live streaming our meetings for those who are interested. As part of these changes Councillors have agreed that for all virtual meetings, any documents being discussed will be put on the website, prior to the meeting, and any residents/or members of the press wishing to ask questions should contact the clerk by 5pm on the day prior to the meeting.

At the moment we are still able to post agendas on the noticeboard by the shop in the village and on the new noticeboard on Warwick Gates. The agenda and draft minutes should be available on our website. Any problems, please call the clerk or send her an email.

The requirement for an annual meeting of the Parish Council has been cancelled for this year and, as it would not be feasible to gather people together with the current social distancing restrictions in place, we do not intend to hold the annual Parish assembly in May. At present members of the Parish Council will continue in their positions/portfolio roles (the need for re-election has been suspended by the recent legislation).

Every resident should have received a leaflet offering help if required in these difficult times; help can be needed in many forms and we are very keen for all members of our community to feel

able to reach out for support and help at this time. All communications will be dealt with in confidence so if you need anything please email: covid-19@bishopstachbrook.com, phone 07732 458084 or contact our Clerk. Thank you so much to the many residents who have volunteered to help in these efforts - this is a marathon not a sprint and as such having many willing volunteers on our books will make a difference as time goes on. There is also lots of information regarding Covid-19 on Warwickshire County Council's and Warwick District Council's websites.

As well as our wonderful NHS our District and County Councils have been providing an invaluable service. County Cllr. Les Caborn has updated us that WCC are doing everything they can locally to ensure that our hospitals and care homes have sufficient PPF and that the situation is being carefully monitored. Les wanted to emphasise that hospitals are still open for non Covid-19 conditions and if you need to visit A&E then please be assured that the Covid-19 wards are separate from this area - don't suffer in silence! We remain very grateful to Les for all he is doing for our community.

District Cllrs. Andrew Day and David Norris have been working to ensure that our local services are maintained; you will have noted that the green bins were collected again over the last couple of weeks and that recycling is being prioritised. As well as leading WDCs efforts as a whole, Andrew has been instrumental in the support provided to businesses throughout the district in the form of business rates reliefs and grants. Our Sports and Social Club and many shops have received grants from WDC to help them at this difficult time.

With empty roads we have all witnessed the excessive speeding through our Parish - this is a national problem. The Police have been alerted to the problems within the Parish and we are sure they will be acting very soon. Excessive speeding can result in even more pressure being applied to our NHS and emergency services - please think about this and amend your actions accordingly.

The social distancing rules are hard for many of us; however, they are the rules and everyone should feel obliged to follow them. Can we therefore add our voice to calls for residents to act responsibly at this time. This includes: not using the play or gym equipment; not congregating with people outside of your household; ensuring you try to stay 2m away from people when out exercising; and discouraging friends and family from outside your household from visiting you for social reasons.

Finally, a reminder that the Lower Heathcote Local Centre consultation is currently running. Information is available on the village website please do comment.

The next virtual meeting of the Parish Council is on Thursday, 7th May at 6.30pm.





make use of the permitted footpaths around Tachbrook. If these walks aren't quite to your liking why not pick and mix paths to match your tastes.







Later, I open my bedroom window to see the huge new 'pink' moon, night mist hangs over the tree tops, and I hear an owl hoot. I forget the sign for owl.



#### History Group exploring Warwick

#### From May 2016

It's often the case that we don't visit local sights and tourist gems that are on our doorstep. Have you visited Warwick Castle, for instance in the last 10 years? A couple of years ago we had an excellent talk on the 1695 Great Fire of Warwick and the subsequent rebuilding of the town. Members then asked for a guided tour to see the results of the reconstruction of the town and April's meeting fulfilled that request. Graham Sutherland, former Town Crier, and his wife Maureen were guides for our two groups, providing a lively historical snapshot, peppered

was effectively protected by three gates - at the north, east and west approaches to the town. Marauders from the south (perhaps from Bishop's Tachbrook?) were thwarted by the Castle and the River. The east and west gates remain distinctive features; the demolished third gate was situated on the present island at Northgate. Proof that the town is on a hill was demonstrated in 1916. A tram was parked outside the Warwick Arms Hotel, (formerly a coaching inn stabling 60 horses). The tram's conductor released the brake, believing that the driver was at the

> helm. He wasn't and the tram careered down the hill until it crashed and rolled over at Eastgate.

At Westgate the impressive Guild Hall was quickly sold and the contents disbursed by the Guild Master, Thomas Oken, to prevent the king's

forces from stealing the valuable contents. The building was later bought by the Earl of Leycester to provide accommodation for retired soldiers – as it still does. We were warned that the Guild Hall (now a chapel) has no lighting or heating so it



with humorous anecdotes.

A wall plaque erected in 2014 tells us that in the year 914 Aethelflaed, brave and victorious warrior against the Vikings and ruler of Mercia following her husband's death, set up the

fortified hill settlement of Warwick. It

is not advisable to visit in the evening in winter. From this viewpoint can be seem the spire of St Mary Immaculate Church, where Tolkein, author of The Lord of the Rings, was married: one connection with the literary world, another one being Landor House, the home of the poet Walter Savage Landor and now part of King's High School.

Connections with the sporting world are provided by the Racecourse, which hosted the first Gold Cup race in 1707 but later moved to Cheltenham. Then the boxing Turpin family culminating with Randolph, (who in 1951 became famous after beating Sugar Ray Robinson to become world middleweight champion), is celebrated by a fine statue in the Market Place.

We saw buildings associated with famous, often eccentric characters as well as benefactors - notably Thomas Oken, who bequested his great wealth to the town - still administered as the Henry VIII Trust. (His fine Tudor house in Church Street, formerly the Dolls' Museum, is now a charming tea room). And even if you know that the

low studded door in Barrack Street leads down into the dungeon, have you ever noticed the metal hooks in the adjacent walls? Ropes were attached to them to hold back the crowds excitedly awaiting an execution on the scaffold – a jolly morning's entertainment.

And do you know why Warwick University is so called, to the confusion of parents of would-be students? Originally the university was to be built beside the Stratford Road in Warwick; the land was earmarked, plans drawn up, and legal documents prepared, but WW II intervened. After the war the owner of the land sought to increase the charge for the land, but the university authorities wouldn't accept the inflated price and negotiated instead for the site at Coventry, but retained the name in the original legal documents.

And what about a 19<sup>th</sup>century scandal to complete our tour? When the Earl was away from home, Daisy invited her royal friend, who would arrive incognito and be taken to the Castle via the Town Gate in Castle Lane. A

new young coachman was deputed to take the visitor back to the train and he politely greeted the passenger "Good morning, Your Highness". When Daisy was informed she dismissed the coachman for indiscretion. No paparazzi around in those days.
