

# A time of transition

We are now well into spring with the trees, fields and hedgerows coming to life and we are moving towards summer. The month of May was named after the Greek goddess Maia who, in Roman religion and myth, embodied the concept of growth. So, we can see how the abundance of spring is linked to the name. It is a month of transition to the promise of summer.

The church in Bishop's Tachbrook is also in transition from one priest-incharge to another. The process of advertising the vacancy is dealt with by the Coventry Diocesan Office, but the parish has contributed its thoughts about what is required by compiling a parish profile document. The post is being advertised in the Church Times and interviews have been planned for mid-June.

Although we have no priest-in-charge at present, church services resumed on Easter Sunday, with a visiting minister

leading services on Sunday mornings. All the current Covid protocols are strictly observed. The Parochial Church Council (PCC) still meets monthly to deal with church matters, including services and events. One of the main summer events is the Church Fete in June but, as this comes rather early in the lifting of Covid restrictions, we have rescheduled this to the afternoon of the 4<sup>th</sup> September in the St. Chad's Centre and surrounds. So, the village church is in another period of transition, moving to a new minister and hopefully out of lockdown to more normal times

Eastertide is the time between Easter Sunday and Ascension Day, which this year is on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> May. It is the church's belief that Jesus ascended to heaven on the 40<sup>th</sup> day after his resurrection. This is an important Christian festival, so you may hear the church bells ringing early on that day – one of the traditional ways to celebrate such a remarkable event.

#### **PARISH GIVING SCHEME**

St Chad's Church is a Grade 1 listed building, dating back to the 12<sup>th</sup> century. It is the responsibility of the parish to maintain the church, an expensive task. The church roof has been repaired, after the theft of the lead, but there are still things that need to be done to keep this building going for future generations.

Last year the PCC joined the Parish Giving Scheme. Run by Coventry Diocese it is an efficient way of making sure that contributions and the gift aid they generate reach the church. It involves setting up a direct debit that would take money from your account on 1<sup>st</sup> of the month and that money is then transferred to the church account, plus the gift aid, within a few days. The money can only be used for St Chad's and if in any month you feel you cannot afford the amount you can ring them and they will cancel the payment.

# **Parish Council News**

At our April meeting we thanked County Councillor Les Caborn, who is retiring after supporting our parish for many years. Les has set a strong example of public service, passionate about helping others and clearly intrinsically motivated to make our community a better place. Les supported the building of the St. Chad's Centre, championed the concept of the country park and has been heavily involved in the provision and funding for the traffic calming, play equipment, drop kerbs and many other projects. As chair of the Parish Council I have always found him supportive and willing to advise; he was also excellent at ensuring the meeting kept moving forward "Chairman, can we move on?" being his favourite phrase when I first started. We will all miss him and wish him and his family well.

In April we held two meetings; the ordinary meeting and the Annual Parish Assembly. The Assembly consisted of reports on the year from County, District and Parish. If you want to read the reports they are on our website.

After over a year of planning and waiting, the replacement of the slabs, near Church Lees on the village green, has finally been finished. Grass seed has been planted and is being watered by our contractors; we are very grateful. Please do keep off this area to

allow the seed to germinate. Any help from local residents with watering would be appreciated. The Christmas tree is also in need of water. I hope you'll agree that this is a really nice improvement to that area and, even while we wait for the grass to grow, visually appealing!



We're really pleased to announce that the phase II play equipment for the Meadow has now been ordered and we are hoping it will be installed in time for the summer holidays! The area will need to be closed when the equipment is installed but we will try and provide as much notice as possible. A replacement spring for the gate has been ordered and should be fitted

soon. If you drive to the Meadow, we ask that you please do not park in front of the gate, this entrance is used by our contractor and emergency services. Please think before you park.

A planning application for the refurbishment of the Sports and Social Club driveway has been submitted to the District Council. A considerable part of this work should be covered by funding from the District Council in lieu of incorrect precept calculations.

We are still trying to obtain ownership of the Oakley Meadows allotments, Bloor Developments are aware of our frustration at the slow progress and have promised to try and speed this up.

The Neighbourhood Development Plan is continuing to move forward thanks to Cllr. Wellsted. We expect to receive the Inspector's final report in May at which point alterations to the plan can be made and we can move forward to referendum.

Cllr. Leigh Carter has been involved in discussions regarding the footpath/cycleway on Harbury Lane. There will be a working group of which Cllr. Carter will be involved. He has also arranged for Harbury Lane to be cleaned on a regular basis. District Cllr. David Norris is arranging for the District Council to look at the flooding issues on the perimeter path around Warwick Gates.

Cllr. Sean Deely is on committees for

the new School and Country Park. A planning application for the Park should be submitted in the summer. The County Council has just appointed architects for the school.

The Play Area Working Party is working with the District Council and developers to try and make sure that play areas on the new developments can be used all year round. It has been noted that some flood during the winter months and others lack maintenance. We are very grateful that they have taken on this role. A contractor has been appointed for repairing the BMX track and also surfacing the outdoor gym equipment. When we have a date for this work we will let you know.

The water system on the Meadow allotments was recently repaired and it has been brought to our attention that this will require replacing. We are awaiting quotes for this work which might have to wait until 2022/23 financial year.

Litter is continuing to blight our community, Cllr. Wellsted and District Cllr. Andrew Day have managed to procure some signage reminding people to take pride in their community. In addition WDC have been undertaking additional runs to empty the public bins.

Our next meeting (the Parish Council AGM) is on 13th May at 7.30pm and will be held in the St. Chad's Centre main hall. We will be socially

distanced. Hand sanitizer will be available and masks must be worn. If any resident would like to attend could they please contact the clerk beforehand so we have an idea of numbers and can try and accommodate residents. Many thanks.

# **Natural Carbon Capture**

We have had a meeting with Dan Loveard from Warwickshire Wildlife Trust (20/4/2021) to discuss a range of projects to make the most of the Parishes green spaces. These include wildflower-planting verges, gardens, the churchyard etc. In fact practically any green-planted patch of land will help absorb CO2. In addition hedges can be added to and new ones planted. Where appropriate trees and perhaps a community orchard can be planted, existing woodland can be enhanced through expert forestry.

Improving habitat and bio diversity are important objectives. Looking after and developing natural and manmade ponds (such as SUDS pools in the Village and Country Park) and creating bog gardens will attract wildlife, enhance the landscape and sequester carbon.

At the same time, planting will conserve the ancient Feldon character of our area of Warwickshire made up of rolling agricultural landscapes and parkland.

TRACC's project fits in well with The Dunsmore Living Landscape's Wilder Communities Scheme, a joint project with Warwickshire Wild Life Trust and Sponsor, Severn Trent Water. The Scheme is designed to empower schools and the community to go wild by going green.

Most important Severn Trent can provide the funding that will help BT reduce its carbon footprint See link https:// online.pubhtml5.com/opdy/hduy/ #p=1

The first step is to make an expert assessment of the green spaces in BT. Dan Loveard coming for a Parish walkabout to help us with this.

#### **BT Repair Café**

As mentioned in the last TRACC News, a Zoom meeting was arranged 23/4/21 with Phoebe Brown from Repair Cafe Wales (RCW). The idea was to learn and benefit from one of the UK's leading experts in setting up and running community repair and share schemes. Phoebe outlined the support RCW can provide including individual indemnity insurance at greatly reduced premiums, providing template forms for repair descriptions and records, advice on recruiting skilled repairers and publicity for the BT repair & share shop. RCW will also provide links for PAT training courses available at reduced rates for members. Terms of the insurance require that the person/s who repair electrical items should be trained in Portable Appliance Testing (PAT) to ensure electrical safety

To generate interest and recruit people with repair skills, Phoebe

recommended that we contact our local College, Men's Sheds, local repair businesses and contact nearby Bar Zero repair cafe at Barford to attend a typical repair session. It was suggested that we might borrow some of Bar Zero's repairers to help get BT's shop up and running.

As well as visiting Bar Zero, the next stage is to apply for membership of Repair Café Wales, discuss funding with BT Parish Council and decide on the venue for BT's Repair and Share, possibilities are St Chads and the Social Club.

# Integrated sustainable green transport

Andrew Day leader of Warwick District Council reported at the last BT Parish Council meeting that as a result of the recent cooperation and prospective merging of WDC and Stratford District Council operations, the proposed new Local Plan will include a comprehensive joint initiative for Integrated Sustainable Green transport for South Warwickshire. This is part of the ambitious programme to tackle the effects of Climate change. Andrew said that he will keep TRACC informed and they will be consulted on key developments.

# **Green Shoots Funding webinar**

I attended a Green Shoots briefing webinar hosted by Tracy Southam of Warwickshire Community & Voluntary Action (CAVA) with speakers Steve Smith and Andrew Pau from WCC briefing on the Council's actions on

Climate Change and the remit of Green Shoots Funding. Since declaring a climate emergency in 2019, the Council has wide ranging schemes to reduce carbon emissions in private homes and the councils' own operations including: public buildings, schools, decarbonising the council's estate with retrofitting insulation and renewable energy and transitioning the council's transport to Electric vehicles and improving carbon zero public transport to enable less use of private vehicles. Plus there are detailed initiatives on reducing waste. expand recycling and reducing flooding caused by climate change.

The new Green Shoots £1million fund is available for community solutions that will deliver carbon emission reduction throughout Warwickshire. It could be planting programmes, schemes to changing people's behaviour, encourage walking, cycling, taking public transport, composting and recycling, repair & exchange shops, fitting renewable forms of energy on community buildings. The deadline for funding applications for projects up to £25000 ends 17/5/2021. Below is a link to the Green Shoots presentation.

# **Growing tips**

# By greenfingers

# What to Sow in May

- Sow French beans, runner beans, squash, cucumbers and pumpkin seeds directly into prepared beds outside. Be alert to late frosts (for which a covering of horticultural fleece should provide sufficient protection).
- Sow sweet corn outside in blocks, at least 45cm (18in) spacing, with two seeds per hole. The strongest seedling can be selected later.
- Sow cauliflowers and purple sprouting broccoli for harvesting next winter.
- Try sowing some unusual vegetables such as kohl rabi (like a large white above-ground turnip), scorzonera and salsify.
- After all risk of frost has passed, plant out tomatoes, courgettes and pumpkins that were previously sown under cover.
- Brussels sprouts for next winter should now be ready for transplanting after early or mid-spring sowing.
- Plant out artichokes that were previously sown under cover.
- Self-blanching celery can also be planted out towards the end of the month.
- Ridge cucumbers can be sown indoors now, for planting out in early June.

# Other veggiejobs

- Watch for the small holes flea beetles make on brassica seedlings. Water plants well to help them continue growing despite the pest damage.
- Protect carrots with insect-proof mesh to prevent carrot root fly.
- Protect brassicas and peas from pigeons.
- Pick yellowing leaves off brassicas promptly, to prevent spread of grey mould and brassica downy mildew.
- Put up codling moth traps in apple trees.
- Put bird protection in place for all soft fruit.
- Keep on top of weed control and continue through to summer.

# **Nature Page**

"There's a Rat in my compost what am I gonna do?" Simple answer is - not a lot!



I bought two 'Dalek' type compost bins a couple of years ago. With Rats in mind I wired the bottoms. I never put cooked food in the bins, mainly vegetable peelings, teabags, tissues, grass cuttings and soft green garden waste plus sawdust, so nothing very appetising for a Rat really. The wire kept them out for a couple of years, then security was breached. I turn the heap every week or two which is a bit of a palaver. I noticed that the heap was being turned 'Bigtime' rotting stuff from the bottom being brought to the top while fresh stuff was being buried. The Rat is turning the heap looking for morsels of anything edible. So I'm still turning the heap but I'm getting substantial help. Living on the edge of the country park Rats will always be a feature. The Rat can stay, we'll work the heap together and I've got to say I do make cracking compost.

By the start of April most of the white flowers in the hedgerow were Blackthorn (Sloe). It's often a turbulent time for the weather. My Dad and Grandad would often talk about a 'Blackthorn Winter'. "You can't trust it", they would say, "we could even get snow!" And we did.

Hawthorns next, that should calm it down. Damson blossoms out as the Birch catkins sway in the cold breeze. None of this is good news for people with pollen allergies though.

Just remembered back in mid-March, I walked passed an empty greenhouse. The door was open just enough to let a small bird in. Inside was a green Warbler flitting about. I slowly opened the door and moved round the back of the greenhouse outside. The little Warbler flew out - phew! It may have been a Wood Warbler or a Willow Warbler or a Chiffchaff. It was an early one at that. Within a few days I heard my first Chiffchaff so, maybe that's what it was.

On 8th of April I heard the familiar chatter of a Swallow as it dashed by me in Lighthorne. With regular north winds it was a surprise to see one. Every year I get a feeling in my water when I am about to see my first Swallow, often the day before. With

the north winds I poo-pooed my water feelings. I should have trusted them.

The Jackdaws habits are changing with the longer days. Instead of leaving the village in the twilight they hang around still building their nests and often keeping an eye on me if I'm in the garden. The braver ones will come close to get my attention. Their training of me has paid off because they usually get some food. They are taking more food on board, building themselves

up for the egg laying and chick feeding that's heading their way.

There's a pair of Blue Tits busily nesting up above the outhouse door the same box has been used for three years. It faces north.

Back in March I heard, then saw, one of my Hedgehogs in the back garden. Food's going out now each night around 9ish. I'm hoping another one will turn up. Everything's starting up again in more ways than one.

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
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
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
