(A Blacksmiths was established in 1897) On Saturday nights the stable was cleaned out and fresh bales of straw were put out ready for Sunday morning's church service. This was where the first church service was held in the village.

What would that generation have made with DIY stores these days? And again how popular television programmes like 'The Repair Shop' and garden transformation programmes would have appealed to them.

You can get so much help on line these days and with the right tools and safety procedure step by step instructions and if all fails you've got professional help like Check a Trade or a friendly neighbour to help.

There are lots of things we cannot do by ourselves e.g. give someone a kiss or hug. We pray on our own to God knowing we are not alone.

Community Cafe

We are hoping to reopen the Community Cafe on 7th July at 11.15pm.

There will be a few changes. Customers' details will have to be taken for track and trace. Masks will need to be worn, when not sitting down.

Windows will need to be open. There will have to be space left between non family members.

Parish Council News

We recently held the annual general meeting of the Parish Council at which I was fortunate to be re-elected as its Chair; I am grateful for the continued support of my fellow councillors and the opportunity to serve.

At the meeting the Clerk was also reconfirmed as our finance officer and Cllr. Carter was re-elected as our vicechair. Cllr. Ray Bullen agreed to remain as Planning lead with Cllr. Brewster as our adviser on Technology and Digital Matters, Cllr. Carter will continue to lead on Traffic and Road Community Safety, Cllr. Cathy Herbert on risk assessments, community engagement and the Sports and Social Club driveway project, Cllr. Martin Drew will continue to build on the fantastic progress he has made in taking TRACC (Climate Change Group) initiatives forward, Cllr. Wellsted will continue to focus on the Neighbourhood Plan, Working Parties and jointly on amenities matters with Cllr. Deely who continues to represent the Parish on the Country Park and School boards. Our newest recruit, Cllr. Lesley Keung will decide her portfolio at our next meeting.

It was our first 'face to face' meeting for a year and strict Covid procedures were in place, it was really nice to see people albeit in masks for Covid and thick coats (due to the unseasonably cool and wet May we all experienced.)

Given the inclement weather, district Cllrs. Andrew Day and David Norris assured us that they are asking officers to sort the flooding on the perimeter path and put bins on the edges of the new developments until the roads are adopted by the County Council. They also asked that we make you aware of the South Warwickshire Local Plan consultation which has just started and ends on Monday 21 June. Details are available on the District Council website and many residents have been commenting on Facebook - please also respond formally as not everyone will see the comments on Facebook.

Given the short notice (following his election), our new County Councillor; Cllr. Jan Matecki was unable to attend our meeting but has assured us that he will give a full update on our existing issues at the next meeting. I was able to contact Jan to congratulate him on his victory and, I was also able to get a message to Kelly Box, the runner up candidate who ran a strong campaign and highlighted some key issues that will affect our local region. Well done to them both (and all our candidates) for stepping up.

We are hoping for dates for the OWR chevrons replacements and OWR scheme plus whether the Seven Acre Close scheme has passed the safety audit and, if it has, a date for installation. Cllr. Deely is waiting for an

update on the Othello Avenue drop kerb installation.

The country park is moving forward slowly. Cllr. Deely regularly updates councillors. We understand that, when the Country Park opens, it will be a phased opening with the western end first. Architects are working on the overall site plan plus providing parking for the country park. The County Council are working on the sports pitch requirement and drafting the framework for the community's use of the school facilities.

Cllr. Carter is also involved in discussions regarding Harbury Lane improvements. He is investigating a raised table near Heathcote Primary School to slow traffic. We would like to see the speed limit reduced to 30mph but it is up to the County Council with the input of the police to decide.

Cllr. Drew is looking at ways of making everyone aware of which items can be recycled and where - I'm really excited about this as I often am not sure (when it says things like "check local guidance"). He is working with Cllr. Brewster and District Council officers to get this information to us.

The spring has arrived for the gate (at least one sort of Spring has) into the play area and it will be fixed very shortly. Our inspector has made us aware of a slight raised surface near the trampoline. The company who installed the equipment has been

made aware and should be visiting shortly. Please do take care. Phase II equipment should be installed week commencing 5th July. Unfortunately the play area will be closed for 2 weeks. Please see July magazine for further updates.

The BMX track repairs should take place week commencing 21st June and the outdoor gym equipment surfacing should also take place that week.

Some tree work will be taking place on the Meadow at the beginning of July. Please see July magazine for further updates.

Apologies that there are no new updates to report on the transfer of the allotments on Oakley Meadows. We are regularly chasing the developer.

Our next meeting will be on 24th June at 7.30pm at Heathcote Primary School. If you wish to attend please contact the clerk as we must know numbers beforehand and also have contact details.

You can now participate in the national programme, there are a number of options for testing which make it really easy for you to organise:

Order tests to be delivered to home from https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/testing/

Make an appointment at your local test centre - https://maps.test-and-trace.nhs.uk/

Collect tests from participating pharmacies - https://maps.test-and-trace.nhs.uk/

Please make sure you check opening times and collection times of individual sites or pharmacies, but once you have your home tests you will find simple guidance to help you carry them out effectively and instructions for what to do next, including where to record your results.

This is important even if you have had both vaccinations as you may still get the virus and spread it (including to those who are yet to have the vaccine) and equally it helps with the identification of new strains and how they are working.

TRACC time

The Carbon Green Capture project is up and running; identifying green spaces for wild planting around the Parish. TRACC member Keith Wellsted and I had a Village walkabout with Dan Loveard from Warwickshire Wildlife Trust. We covered the church grounds and field to the north of them, moved on to the Village Green(s) and green spaces off St Chad's Rd and Farm Walk then up to Mallory Road to see the green areas there. This gave Dan insight as to the type and existing uses of the locations for proposed planting. It is important to take into consideration such things as not covering the village green in too many trees as it is used for events etc. Keith sent Dan a map that details all the green spaces in the Village envelope and he will come back with a list of proposals that we will then consult residents on to get their views. Good news too: Dan confirmed that Severn Trent is providing funds for these green projects.

This is just the first step in BT going green. It is intended to extend it to all areas in the parish including the Country Park. Sean Deely, BT Parish Councillor and member of the Country Park Steering Group will be at the next TRACC meeting to discuss how Warwickshire Wild Life Trust can be involved in developing green carbon capture in the Country Park.

BT Repair Cafe

There is also progress on setting up the repair and recycle café. It's planned to visit Barford's Bar Zero repair café in early June. Rather than reinvent the wheel, this will enable us to see at first hand how the repair café operates by talking to the repairers and organisers. It will also be useful to learn about the benefits of being a member of Repair Café Wales that has a tried and tested system and support for creating and running a repair cafe. In addition we intend to see the Sydni Centre Repair Café, Leamington in action (meets 1 Saturday each month 11am -2pm)

Growing tips

Sowing & Planting in June

Direct Sowing

In dry weather draw your drill and water it well prior to sowing and then just water with a fine rose after to settle the seeds in.

Successional sowing each fortnight of beetroot, French beans, early carrots, kohlrabi, early peas, lettuce, rocket, turnips, endive, radish, spring onions will give you a constant supply of salads and vegetables at their peak for your plate.

- French and Runner Beans
- Maincrop peas
- Beetroot
- Carrots
- Turnips
- Swedes
- Cauliflowers
- Chicory
- Endive
- Kohlrabi
- Sweetcorn
- Squash
- Courgette and Marrows



Planting Out

Pot grown runner and dwarf beans should be safe to plant out now as the danger of frost should be past. Outdoor tomatoes can also go into their final position. Don't just move them straight from the greenhouse or their growth will be checked. Use a cold frame to condition them or move them back into the house at night for a few days before they go into the big wide world. Your leeks may well be ready now, about pencil thickness and they're ready to plant.

"As I scribble this we're nearly at the end of a turbulent Spring. Hawthorn buds are fit to burst. The Keck or Cow Parsley jostles with Nettles and Comfrey. Unless its really cold Spring slips in then gallops through. We recently tried Nettles in a risotto. Not a particularly strong flavour but packed full of goodness.

The Wild Arums are flowering, their long pointed green sheathes waiting for flies to pollinate them. They're also known as Cuckoo Pint as they flower around the time you might hear the Cuckoo. Good luck with that! I did hear and see one a couple of years ago.

My early potatoes are loving the rain (unlike me) and growing like mad. The Rat is still doing sterling stuff in the compost heap for hardly any reward. Just like having a small JCB in there (other diggers are available).

I see the Fox most nights. I think its a dog Fox coming alone. Wish the Vixen and cubs would arrive. There was a baby Rabbit in the garden the other day. It would have just fitted into the palm of your hand. It was using the gap in the wood store door as a bolt hole. These little Rabbits or 'kittens' are on their own very quickly. With the Fox and a few cats around here it will have to sharpen up a bit.

The Swallows chase each other across the sky over the cottages. At the moment there's three of them like last year. Its an odd number so I hope more turn up. House Martins are back over Tachbrook and Moreton Morrell. I didn't see many last year. I'm seeing more Swifts though, at least 15 were up zooming about over Newbold Comyn.

Been lucky enough to see Hares recently, one down the lane near us and another on a farm down the Fosse. It was on that farm I also had a Wheatear fly in front of me joined by



another. The name comes from Anglo-Saxon for 'white rump' So its more like a 'white rear' than a 'wheatear'. The old books I have say they breed in small numbers around here so, maybe, they have increased. Hope so, only ever seen a couple of them.

Now my extended family of Jackdaws are working hard feeding young at the mo. The braver ones stalk me in the garden to get my attention - always works. Love watching them up close when I boost their food supplies. There's a dominant one that raises its head and neck feathers making it look bigger. That one arrives with a squawk

and barges another Jackdaw out of the way as it flies into it on the lawn. There's one I feel sorry for that has a bad leg or foot. It almost lays down on the outhouse roof to take the weight off its leg. Its done that for a couple of years now so its coping but must be in pain. There's a happy bonded couple that land on the lawn, both calling and both with head feathers raised. One will bow down to the ground while the other one nuzzles into it. Its a proper complex little group full of character. Nice to watch up close.
