On a priest, a churchyard and a fete

As an update to our efforts to recruit a priest-in-charge of St. Chad's we can report that an interview took place on 17th June in the church and it went very well. The candidate now has to be interviewed by Bishop John of the Coventry Diocese and we await news from that event.

Some of you will have noticed the improved appearance of the churchyard over the past week. In the lower churchyard the heaps of soil have been levelled out and grass seed put down. The back hedge has also been trimmed back to allow the mower to manoeuvre between the rows more easily. There are still two dead trees to be removed by the fence which we hope will be done shortly. Anyone who can spare an hour or so to help maintain the appearance of the churchyard would be very welcome. A little help would make a big difference.

Hopefully the lifting of restrictions on 19thJuly paves the way for the Fete to take place on Saturday, 4th September, in the afternoon, in the St Chad's Centre and surrounds. It will be smaller scale then usual taking account of still being careful because of COVID but please note the date. It would be good to have support for a village event.

Parish Council News

Whilst the recent spike in Covid cases remains of concern; hopefully the link between infections and hospitalisations has been broken through significant vaccine uptake and we can continue to travel towards "the new normal".

June brought our second face-to-face meeting with strict Covid procedures in place in the hall at Heathcote Primary School. Both the hall at the St. Chad's Centre and the hall at Heathcote Primary School have been risk assessed by the clerk and the management of both venues. If you wish to attend one of our meetings but are concerned, risk assessments are available from the clerk.

Sadly, having taken advice from Warwick District Council, we had to regretfully ask the WI to delay their annual cake stall on the Village Green. Whilst we understand that alternative arrangements may have been made, we hope to see this much loved event return to its rightful home when the restrictions are lifted.

Cllr. Keith Wellsted was applauded at our meeting for finally securing a date for the Neighbourhood Plan referendum; 30th September. He will now be arranging posters, leaflets, etc. to ensure that residents are aware and vote on 30th. Please put the date in your diary.

Cllr. Lesley Keung has agreed a

portfolio of Health and Wellbeing for humans and animals. Lesley is passionate about Oakley Wood and I'm sure she will be a strong advocate for moving forward with our desire to see a path from the village all the way to the wood.

Our District and County Councillors are liaising to try and arrange for the vegetation obstructing Oakley Wood Road cycleway to be cleared. They appreciate that this is a very well used path and it needs urgent attention. We have also asked if it could be added to a schedule for attention earlier next year to ensure we don't have this issue again.

The vegetation at the entrance to the Meadow should have been cut back by now. We are hoping that our Working Party will be able to meet shortly to tackle other areas in the parish. Our grass contractor and his assistants are doing a wonderful job. The reseeding on the village green (enclosing the new pathways) looks very good thanks to the watering it received earlier this year from our contractor.

Thanks to County Cllr. Jan Matecki and Cllr. Leigh Carter the chevrons on Oakley Wood Road have been replaced. Let's hope this solves the issue of cars leaving the road and crossing the cycleway.

OWR2 scheme works are scheduled for 12th July. Seven Acre Close safety audit

has been completed and work will commence on the traffic calming measures in Spring 2022.

Councillors have received a request for a 30mph speed limit on Oakley Wood Road past Oakley Meadows. At the planning stage of this development the Parish Council asked if this could be actioned. County Highways said due to the rural nature of the road this was not possible. Instead the road was widened to accommodate the traffic from the new development. Following a discussion at our meeting councillors have agreed to approach County Highways for consideration of a 40mph speed limit past Oakley Meadows as the Parish Council does not believe motorists will abide by a 30mph speed limit due to the design of the road.

Having had roadworks outside my house for the last few weeks, I'm acutely aware that there are lots of road closures due to water and resurfacing works in our area - please keep an eye on Facebook and the websites for details.

Cllr. Sean Deely understands we might be seeing the planning applications for the Country Park and School in September. At the moment the County Council is suggesting the northern part of the Country Park will be opened first, possibly late 2022 or early 2023 with the school following in September 2023 - the Parish Council continue to push for the date to be sooner.

Cllr. Drew has produced a 'recycling

guide' with the help of Warwick District Council. This should be available on the website shortly. Martin Drew and Cllr. Wellsted are trying to organise a repair shop. If you want to be involved please contact Martin or the clerk.

If you drive to the play area on the Meadow please ensure that you do not block access to the Meadow. The gate is the access for emergency services and it must remain clear at all times. We are in the process of installing signage to reinforce this. Dogs are not permitted in the play area. The play area is registered with Warwick District Council as a 'no dogs zone'. Signage will be produced shortly.

Pruning of trees on the Meadow will take place on 7th and 8th July so please be careful. The trees on the Sports and Social Club driveway are scheduled for the crowns to be lifted to enable lorries to pass safely. Tree work will also be taking place next to the play area.

Phase II of the equipment to be installed in the play area will be started on 5th July and could take 4 weeks. The contractor will try to keep, as much as possible, of the existing play area open. Please be patient as safety is our, and their, main consideration. We have all worked together to try and get this sorted before the main month of the summer holidays. Whilst the contractors are on site they will be fixing the surfacing around the trampoline and the

movement of the swings along the rail. The xylophone beater should also be re-attached. Thank you to the Play Area Working Party for noticing this and keeping the beater safe.

The surfacing on the outdoor gym equipment was delayed due to a miscalculation error by the supplier. This has been rectified and we are waiting for a date. In the meantime the BMX track repairs should have taken place.

Our internal auditor has reviewed the Parish Council's accounts up to March 2021. The report is on our website. The Annual Return for 2020/21 has been approved by council and can be viewed on our website. If you wish to

view the accounts or have any questions please do not hesitate to contact the clerk.

The Brownies and Rainbows were allocated £500 each from the Parish Council community funding pot. We look forward to hearing how they spend the money.

Councillors will hold a meeting towards the end of July (date tbc) and then there will be no Parish Council meeting until we return to the second Thursday of the month in September. We wish everyone an enjoyable summer and hope that our residents get the chance to take a break!

Bishop's Tachbrook Neighbourhood Development Plan (BTNDP)

The BTNDP has been through two formal consultation processes and has been assessed by an independent planning inspector.

The BTNDP now has to be approved, through referendum, by registered voters in the parish. The date for the referendum will be

Thursday 30th September 2021.

The question on the ballot paper will be:

"Do you want Warwick District Council to use the Neighbourhood Plan for Bishop's Tachbrook to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?"

You will be able to answer YES or NO. This is not a consultation where comments can be considered it is a strict decision on whether, on balance, you think the BTNDP will, or will not, be a useful addition to the planning process as it applies to the parish.

Collect tests from participating pharmacies - https://maps.test-and-trace.nhs.uk/

Please make sure you check opening times and collection times of individual sites or pharmacies, but once you have your home tests you will find simple guidance to help you carry them out effectively and instructions for what to do next, including where to record your results.

This is important even if you have had both vaccinations as you may still get the virus and spread it (including to those who are yet to have the vaccine) and equally it helps with the identification of new strains and how they are working.

Repair Café

To learn more about setting up and running the BT Repair Café, Keith Wellsted and I visited Bar Zero. Barford earlier this month. Started in 2018, Bar Zero has proved a resounding success. Even the isolation of Covid lockdowns was just a temporary setback as Bar Zero went online. Naturally this is not as good as meeting face to face which was restarted 6/6/2021. The skilled repairers at Bar Zero mend a wide range of items from toasters to lawn mowers, bicycles to broken furniture. We asked members how they got started and recruited their team. It turned out that most of the repairers were long-term residents who knew each other and spread the word amongst their friends. Posters in the local shop, publicity on local social media and spreading the word in the pubs and clubs quickly attracted a steady flow of customers.

As attempts via articles in the Parish magazine and on BT Facebook have failed to generate interest in setting up a BT Repair Café, we will follow Bar Zero's example. It will start with a poster campaign displayed, hopefully, in the Shop, Social Club, the Leopard and St Chad's Centre. In addition we will contact members of groups, societies and sports teams and generally ask people to put word about.

The planned visit to the Sydni Centre, Repair Shop has again been postponed owing to the latest Government restrictions. It is hoped they will start at the beginning of August. Meanwhile it will be full steam ahead getting BT's Repair Café up and running.

The Railway Stations of Leamington Spa

Part 3 - Leamington Avenue Station

The opening of the Great Western Railway (GWR) station in Leamington Spa in 1852 next to the London & North Western Railway (LNWR) line provided the spur to the latter company in a decision to establish its own station in a more convenient place to serve the town. And so, in 1854, it opened a small timber framed and clad station off Avenue Road and located adjacent to the 1852 GWR station. Initially called **Leamington Priors**, it soon became **Leamington** (Avenue) Station. It was to be a further six years before this was upgraded to a more substantial and grand building of brick at a cost equivalent today of some £551k.

The building was described as being in the 'Italian' style and the booking hall was notable for its ornamental tiles, made by Mann and Co of London. A timber rail bridge that took the line across the Bath Street/High Street crossroads (alongside the GWR bridge) was replaced in 1883 by a metal structure, more suitable to take the heavier weight of trains by that time.

Although the LNWR line was a loop from Coventry to Rugby via Leamington Spa, it effectively operated as two branch lines. Leamington (Avenue) was the terminus for the Coventry to Leamington services whilst Warwick (Milverton) was the terminus for the Rugby to Leamington/Warwick services.



The line to Rugby was notable in the 1930s for the use of Armstrong Siddeley railcars which had Michelin pneumatic tyres. The concept of petrol motorised railcars had been developed at the beginning of the 19th century in France and pioneered by Daimler and Michelin. A few were trialled in this country in the 1910s but Armstrong Siddeley developed an experimental model that operated on the Leamington/Nuneaton service in the 1930s. They must have been a very novel experience to passengers in what was still very much the age of steam trains. A very unusual feature that can be seen in the accompanying photo is the 'conning tower' on top of the unit where the driver sat and from which he was able to control it in whatever direction it moved. Because of their tyres, they were guiet and popular with passengers. The rail company did have concerns that rail track workers might be at risk in not hearing their quiet approach. However, the main reason for their demise in Britain was probably the build-up to the Second World War. As war clouds gathered, industry, including Armstrong Siddeley, was gearing up to

rearmament and other war production and such projects were very much pushed into the background and so the railcar, and its 'quietness', were quietly forgotten.

The passenger service on the line to Rugby ceased in 1959 (some years before the Beeching axe fell) but the service to Coventry from the Avenue Station continued until given the Beeching coup de gras in 1965. With the closure of freight traffic on the line between Leamington (Avenue) and Rugby, British Rail demolished the station and removed the track, including the demolition of the old LNWR bridge on the Bath Street/High Street junction in 1968.



The demolition of the Avenue Station and the bridge brings me to the end of my story of the history of the railway stations of Leamington Spa. Of four different stations, only one has survived to serve the town.

Considering the ruthless axing of stations and smaller lines carried out in the 1960s following Dr. Beeching's report, we can be thankful that we still have an excellent rail service for Leamington Spa.

Growing tips

By greenfingers

Sowing & Planting in July

- Sow spring cabbage, turnips, Oriental vegetables, chicory, fennel, and autumn/winter salads.
- Carrots can still be sown, but beware of carrot fly when thinning existing seedlings.
- Last chance to sow French beans and runner beans (south of England only).
- Plant out leeks and brassicas for a winter supply, if not yet done.

General care

- Ensure all vegetables get a regular, consistent supply of water. This will aid healthy development, and help to avoid diseases, disorders and bolting.
- Continue to hoe off weeds in dry weather. Done in wet weather, the weeds are liable to re-root.
- Don't forget to stop cordon tomatoes by removing the main shoot. Look for the leaf that's above the fourth truss (set of developing fruit) and cut it off here. This should ensure that all the fruits ripen by the end of the season. Bush tomatoes can be left to their own devices.
- Climbing beans may also need stopping, to maximise cropping on existing sideshoots. Stop them when they reach the tops of their supports.
- Beans need sufficient watering to help the seed pods set.
- Check climbing vegetables are securely tied to supports.

Problems

- Check plants regularly for aphids.
- Watch out for potato blight and tomato blight.
- Look out for asparagus beetle.
- Keep an early eye out for the sunken brown patches of blossom end rot on tomatoes.




Nature Page

Well, I think I mentioned in May that there was a chance of hearing a Cuckoo at that time of year and said good luck with that. Now I can go years between hearing them but, low and behold, soon after mid-May at 5.40am I heard one! It called its strange echoey 'cuckoo' in the still morning air, only four times but that will do for me.

In mid-June I heard it again. Five calls this time in the early morning. It may be years until I hear to again but it's better than nothing! Back in the cottage now scribbling away and I can make out the calls of the young Tawny Owls in the spinney out the front. Since records began, or should I say, since I first noticed a couple of years back, the pair of Tawney's have had two youngsters. This year its three owlets out there. One night the three baby. Owls sat in the Cedar tree and called all night long, (not the Lionel Richie hit), they didn't stop calling to their parents for food and to stay in contact with each other. Can't blame them really. On one evening all three moved from tree to tree, from spinney, along the gardens



and to the tall trees near the end of our garden. There they took turns in calling as light faded on deep dark blue. A parent arrived from the parkland with a furry food parcel, either a mouse or a vole and one baby got lucky. As they gain confidence they'll move more into the park each night then start to learn just how to catch that food.

The hot weather in June made many a Frog dash to the very wild pond for sanctuary. Frogs of all ages and sizes arrived. We had our own 'Frog Fest'. When it cooled down in the evenings they would venture out into the slightly overgrown, I mean well stocked, garden. Moths fluttered around the flowers as Bats flitted about overhead hoping to catch one.

The Fox family seems to be still loosely hanging out together. I saw a cub suckle from its mother last month.

By now they are both almost her size and often squabbling with each other. Nice to see them emerge from the shadows for a sniff about.

The Blue Tits left the nest box without me seeing them go. There's a couple of baby Goldfinches here each day. Not many yet.

The male Great Spotted Woodpecker arrives to the bird table several times a day. Its developed a technique for gathering sunflower hearts. It uses the tip of its substantial beak to start filling, then it turns its head to one side to carefully fill the sides of the beak so it has maximum load when it takes off to return to its young. I now have several Jackdaws, a male Blackbird, a Collard Dove and a limping Pheasant that recognise and approach me for dietary supplements. Every little helps and its a privilege to be trusted by them.
