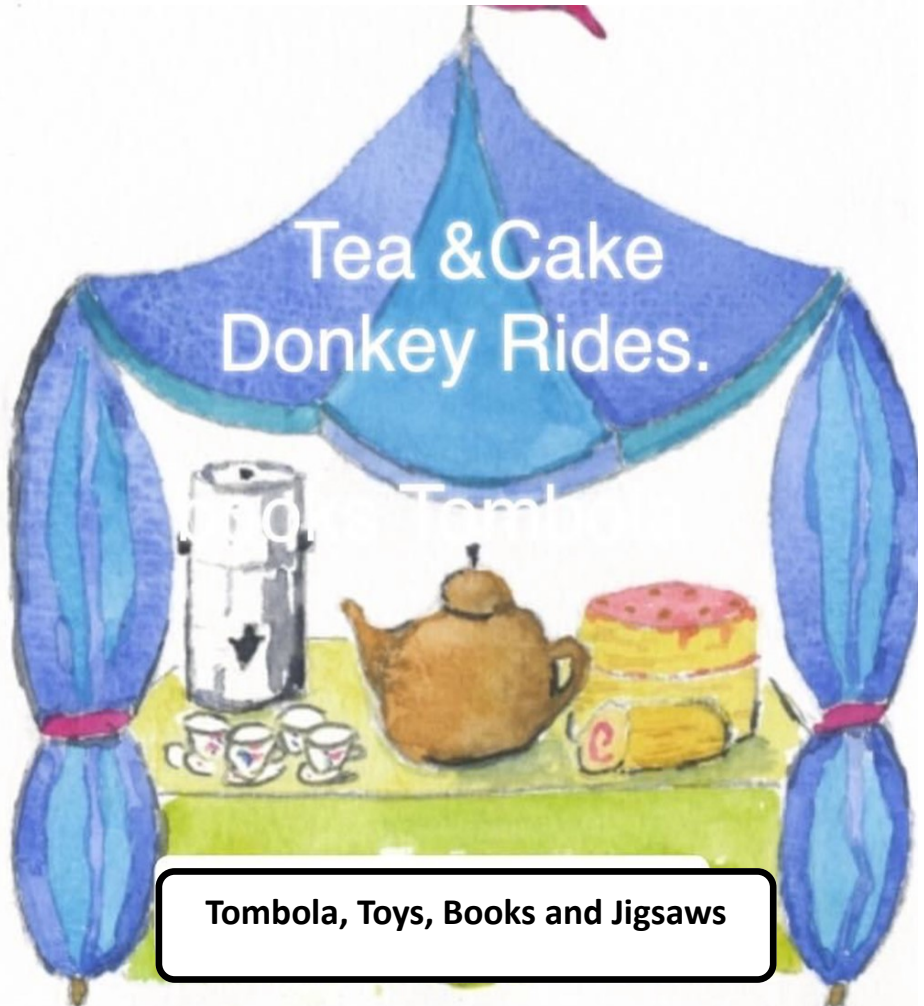

Parish Council News

Back to school (or just “to school” in my house), the summer seems to have passed by really quickly. Hopefully this year will be less disrupted for the young people in our Parish.

In fact, for all our community we hope to see a gradual return to normal over the next few months. To this end, it’s fantastic that, after more than two years since the last one, the Church Fete will take place on 4th September.

As a Parish Council, our attention in September will be focused primarily on the upcoming referendum on the Neighbourhood Plan. This is your chance to vote yes in giving our community more control over planning, development and the funding of infrastructure. Please do get involved in the campaign, and make sure you get out to support our Parish by voting yes.

It’s fantastic to see the new play equipment in good working order and being used by so many; this is a real success for our community. Repairs should have been made to the swings, surfacing around the trampoline and the xylophone beater in the play area. The official opening is at 2pm on Saturday, 11th September. We also hope you will take this opportunity to pop along to the Sports and Social Club after to find out more about the Neighbourhood Plan ahead of the

referendum.

We are still waiting to hear if we have been successful in applying for a grant towards the cost of signage at the play area. Councillors are looking at different designs but would like something different to relate to the play equipment.

Many of you will have noted the completion of the works on Oakley Wood Road comprising a pedestrian refuge (allowing residents to cross the road safely) and a mini roundabout to slow traffic at the junction with Church Hill. We’re really grateful to Cllr. Carter who spearheaded this project and has driven it through to completion.

The scheme compliments the raised table junction already constructed at the junction of Church Hill / Savages Close. The next project will be a raised table junction at Mallory Road / Seven Acre Close with associated speed limit reduction. The design for this scheme is complete and has passed safety audit; we expect construction by AC Lloyd to commence in Spring 2022.

At our meeting in July a representative from JBM Solar attended and spoke about a potential planning application at Chesterton Fields Farm for a solar farm; whilst there may be some community benefits to this proposal (e.g. funded solar panels for community buildings) and the

environmental benefits are obvious, we do appreciate the concerns of some residents in respect of this proposal and the Parish Council will ensure that people are given a chance to feedback their thoughts at a meeting before any decisions are made. More information is available on our website.

Similarly, we know that the proposed EV charging service station would be a big change for our community and, once WDC have validated the planning application, we plan to hold a public meeting to discuss this application in detail and to give our residents a voice.

The District Council has launched a 'rediscover the bus' scheme, you will find information on our website and noticeboards. Warwickshire County Council has set up a task force to look at placing 20mph speed limits on roads suggested by the local community. If you have any suggestions please email the clerk.

The Parish Council has also written to the County Council supporting their application for Government funding towards walking and cycling connections on Harbury Lane.

Tickets are available for local people to attend the Commonwealth Games. Information should be available on the District Council website.

The BMX track repairs are complete and we understand the Working Party

is going to be busy cutting back the vegetation around the track. If you would like to help please contact Cllr. Wellsted.

The outdoor gym equipment surfacing has been laid and we're really grateful to Cllr. Deely for arranging this.

A lot of the vegetation at the entrance to the Meadow has been cut back, we will be looking at undertaking this work earlier next year; in addition, trees have been pruned around the Meadow and on the Sports and Social Club driveway.

Councillors are keeping their fingers crossed that the District Council finally approves the money for the car park on the Meadow. This money is in lieu of incorrect precept payments over a number of years from the District Council. We have just been informed that a decision will be made at September's meeting of the District Council.

Finally, the new allotments on the Oakely Meadow site are still not available. I'm trying everything I can to get this done and I hope to have more of an update next month. I know how much so many of you want these allotments to be made available.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, 9th September at 7.30pm at the St. Chad's Centre, it would be great to see you!

Helping to make Bishop's Tachbrook a better place to live and work

In a referendum on 30th September you will be asked to vote yes or no on the following question:

Do you want Warwick District Council to use the Neighbourhood Plan for Bishop's Tachbrook to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?

We hope you vote yes because we believe it will make our Parish **a better place to live and work.**

Below are some questions and answers which help explain what is taking place and how we've arrived at this point.

What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

A neighbourhood plan focuses on Bishop's Tachbrook Parish rather than the whole of Warwick District or Warwickshire. Our Neighbourhood Plan will help our community to play a stronger role in shaping the areas in which they live and work.

How was the Bishop's Tachbrook Neighbourhood Plan Made?

A Neighbourhood Planning Team of councillors and residents wrote the initial plan. The plan has been through two formal consultations and an examination by an independent planning inspector. The amended plan is now going to referendum.

What does the Neighbourhood Plan contain ?

The document contains a vision for the parish and 12 policies specifically created for Bishop's Tachbrook.

Policy BT1 seeks to identify and protect key features in the parish's landscape. .

Policy BT2 seeks to protect and enlarge the Country Park

Policy BT3 seeks to protect Green Infrastructure - the network of paths, fields, woodlands and watercourses within the parish. It also seeks to add new links to this network

Policy BT4 and BT5 identify key transport improvements to help reduce reliance on private cars and, therefore, reduce the amount of traffic, ease congestion and improve safety.

Policy BT6 designates four areas in the parish as Local Green Spaces. Under national planning policy such spaces have a level of protection akin to Green Belt.

Under Policy BT7 a number of other open spaces in the parish are also protected, but not to the same degree as the designated Local Green Spaces.

Policy BT8 identifies and protects the parish's key community facilities.

Policies BT9 and BT10 set planning policy for Bishop's Tachbrook Conservation Area and heritage assets that have no statutory protection.

Policy BT11 seeks to influence the mix and type of new homes built in the parish by seeking to ensure that this reflects up to date information on housing needs in the parish.

Finally, Policy BT12 sets out a range of measures that should be considered to reduce energy use and carbon emissions.

What does a Neighbourhood Plan do?

If adopted, it will form part of the local development plan for Warwick District. It will have significant weight in making decisions on planning applications.

Will it stop further large scale housing development in the parish?

If, as a review of the Local Plan, or the development of a new Local Plan in cooperation with Stratford District Council, it was decided that our parish should have another major housing development our Neighbourhood Plan would help us fight this. At the very least it would give us more influence about where the housing should be placed - it increases our power.

Will it secure the future of the Country Park

Yes and it seeks to extend the Country Park giving us a larger area to enjoy

Do I have to vote?

Whether you vote or not is entirely your decision.

What happens if the Neighbourhood Plan is rejected at referendum?

Basically we lose the ability to influence our future as effectively.

What is the referendum?

It is a legally binding vote of parish residents to choose if they want to adopt the Neighbourhood Plan. **The day to vote is 30th September.** You should shortly receive a voting card or postal vote if you are registered to vote.

What happens after the vote?

The votes are officially counted. The decision is a simple majority of votes for either Yes or No

“Yes” means the Neighbourhood Plan is adopted as a legal document

“No” means the neighbourhood plan is not adopted and will not be used to support planning decisions in our parish

Who should I contact if I want to know more?

There will be two events to enable you to discuss the plan:

Saturday September 11th from 2.00 - 4.00 at Bishop's Tachbrook Sports and Social Club

Saturday 25th September from 2.00 - 4.00 at Heathcote Primary School

Just started to scribble then two foxes started to squabble in front of the cottage. Had to stop and have a look at them, their red coats lit by the porch light - beautiful!

Ok. I've been watching Robins around the bird table. There's a brave, very hungry Robin that lands on the table almost before I take my hand away. Most species love sunflower hearts. The youngsters have been plain clothed but one is developing the signature red breast. With male Robins being so aggressive towards other Robins its best not to look like a Robin when your young and vulnerable in case adults attack you as you try to learn the ropes.

By the 12th August the singing began. That's a few days later than normal. Whenever the Robins start singing after their breeding and moulting to me its the beginning of the end of Summer. It means the Robins are now declaring territory and so spacing each other out to get more food through the Winter. Any Robin that wins our garden and luxury food flowing bird table has hit the jackpot.

House Martins seem low again with some old nest sites unused. Swallows seemed ok and Swift's have already left these shores.

Butterflies have been making the most of the warm weather. Not seen so many Tortoiseshells this year.

I'm hearing only adult Tawny Owls now. I hope that means the three babies have grown well and are ok.

The Frogs are taking advantage of the pond during warm spells, then leaping around the garden each evening. I'm so glad the small pond is successful. Two years ago it was only a lawn.

Squirrels are spending a lot of time in the old Walnut tree, every now and then you can hear the snap and tumble as they drop a nut.

Now, the brilliant thing around the cottage at the moment is the second release of Hedgehogs! Two years ago 19 were set free. I'm hoping most of them are still with us! So far this year 14 have been set free with more to come. There's a great team of Sally and Ken who nurtured these little creatures back to health before bringing them to the cottage. Some of them have been orphans, captive reared so we hope their natural instincts will see them through. They do have food and water provided each day but they are totally free to roam so who knows!

There was an incident the night before

I wrote this when a particularly large Hedgehog made its way down the garden and beyond the Cedar tree at the front of the cottage.

Now it was a bit late and I'd just got to bed when the screaming started! If you've never heard a Hedgehog scream then think yourself lucky. I've heard it described as sounding like a Duck but its more like a loud baby cry. It goes right through you and its full of fear. I dashed downstairs grabbing a dressing gown and torch. Outside I heard footsteps moving away through the spinney. Most certainly a Fox. The screaming had stopped. There was nothing I could do so I went back to bed.

Minutes later the screaming began again. Out of bed I shot and outside I dashed. The same footsteps of the Fox disappearing into the spinney. But where was the Hedgehog? I found it, curled up in a large ball breathing heavily. As I approached it began to

snort; that's normal defense. I had to go and grab my gloves for protection against the sharp spines. I returned and gently picked up the ball of Hedgehog. It immediately started screaming. Now I'd say you would hear it a field away and it was right in front of my ears! I just hoped there were no serious injuries as I carried the screaming ball back to the garden. I waited with it for a good twenty minutes as it calmed down. A shooting star sped straight down to earth in front of me.

The Hedgehog's breathing slowed. I gently touched it and it didn't flinch. This was good. The Hog was either in total shock or dying. I managed to place a box partially over it so it could get out if it survived.

In the morning I crept down the garden, not really wanting to look. To my surprise it was gone. The box had hardly been moved so I'm presuming a predator hadn't taken it. The

Hedgehog had made it! Brilliant! I think it had screamed so much in fear the Fox had done no more than scare the Hedgehog almost to death. A horrible experience for the Hedgehog and totally alarming for me. You have to hear that scream to believe it, and I hope you never do.



Growing tips

Autumn sowing, even for novice gardeners, is a great way to extend the growing season in your vegetable patch or allotment.

Greenhouses and cold frames can be a great help to get things started in September, as the days cool down from the peak temperatures of Summer.

Broad beans and peas can be fantastic! Broad beans sown in late October are likely to be the first Spring crop you can harvest next year and will be a real treat added raw to the first salads you enjoy as the weather warms up again.

1. Peas and pea shoots
2. Spinach
3. Pak Choi
4. Garlic
5. Winter lettuce
6. Radishes
7. Sugarsnap peas
8. Asparagus
9. Onions, spring onions and shallots
10. Broad beans
11. Lambs lettuce
12. Spring cabbage



If you don't have the time or any inclination to plant any vegetables this Autumn and Winter then you can sow green manure on your plot to enrich the soil ready for your Spring growing activity

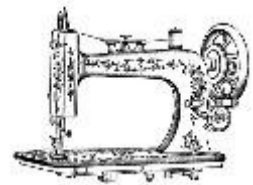


