#### A word from the vicar

Revd. Jonathan Smith



For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Jeremiah 29.11

Well, here we are back at Plan A! Like me, perhaps you've been thinking what Plan A means in theory and in practice for us now. How it differs from plan B? how we managed to avoid plan C? (if there was one!) and even wondering how many other plans there were?

So, with plan A we now look forward, reflecting over the past 22 months and with the sense of weariness to it all. The pandemic has highlighted some of the best of human nature against the backdrop of the saddest times for the world.

As we try to imagine turning a brave corner into, what we hope, will be the post lockdown era, every week still seems to bring new and critical moments in the grand plan of human history. Amidst it all, we are patiently getting used to the various changes it has brought and try to live moment by moment.

The thought of living in the moment that has been critical to my ability to cope through the last couple of years. Ask any parent like me how they have found it, and overall, you will almost certainly get an unsurprisingly weary theme.

But survive we do - because that's what we do! It's in the human DNA that we just hang in. Most recently, I've been reading the great book '4,000 weeks' by Oliver Berkeman and it has reminded me that humans have some remarkable sets of coping mechanisms. His point is that life is made up of very small segments in an overall very short and finite life. So, with that crucial knowledge he encourages our thinking to make wiser choices, maybe even change thinking to act on the plans we thought were once utterly unchangeable.

Of course, all this is nothing new to Christian teaching as Jesus had much to say about the gift of, and use of, time. All the way back to earlier Old Testament times the kings, judges and prophets were continually given quiet solitary moments for God's purposes to encourage them with a vision of his future prosperity (and not to failure) but it would often go against their own plans. Jonah's whale and Deborah's story springs to mind.

The thing is, whether it's A, B or C becomes the best plan, it is of secondary issue to faith. We are called to trust God's best plan first. Sometimes following that process is hard, and unclear, but God is always doing something good behind the scenes, always working for good even when we don't see it. This is the comfort we need when everything can feel hopeless and life continues to feel a challenge.

Finally, it's a relief for those procrastinators like me out there, that no matter what time we have left to live, none of it is wasted. Plans may come and go, and they will, but every moment, however small, counts. I leave you with the famous funeral liturgy which, for me, is the sheer definition of the best use of time. And it says:

...give us Lord the wisdom and grace to use aright the time that is left to us here on earth, to turn to Christ and follow his steps in the way that leads to everlasting life.

May time be yours.

#### Parish Council News

With the ending of most of the restrictions we can now hopefully look forward to a spring where we can think about something other than closing ourselves off. I'm looking forward to being able to hold Parish Council meetings with the doors closed - the January one was particularly chilly!

At that meeting we were joined by officers from Warwickshire County Council to update the council (and attending residents) on progress on the Bishop's Tachbrook Secondary School. The Council and residents were disappointed to learn that the school might not be opened in 2023 due to delays in obtaining access to the land (and, if I'm being brutally honest what would appear to have been a lack of focus on this matter before the latter half of 2021).

Critically important for some of our residents, if the opening is delayed until 2024 then this will mean children will either have to attend another secondary school (for their entire school life) or alternatively that arrangements could be made to accommodate them temporarily off-site and transfer them to Bishop's Tachbrook Secondary School when the school is finished in summer 2024.

The parish council have written to the leader of the county council asking her to urgently look at this matters and ideally to intervene in a way that delivers the best results for the affected pupils. The Parish Council presently believes that over-filling existing schools with additional pupils is likely to be sub-optimal for all concerned and therefore favours an option involving temporary facilities.

Cllr. Sean Deely will be representing the Parish Council on a committee for the construction of the school and will be updating the Parish Council on a regular basis. There is also an intention to nominate a parent to sit on that committee as well.

In road news, the Parish Council has asked for several streets to have reduced speeds of 20mph. We are awaiting the results from the County Council working party, of which County Cllr. Jan Matecki is a member, to see whether we have been successful. Jan is also making some progress on drawing attention to the unsafe speeds on Harbury Lane near Heathcote school – hopefully we can see more action here in the near future.

The play area signage has been approved and we are looking forward to it being erected in the not too distant future. Please remember that this is a children's area so please don't smoking or vape in the enclosed area, no dogs are allowed and please remember to put your rubbish in the bins or take it home.

Several allotment plots have become vacant on the Meadow. The clerk has been working with the allotments manager to identify residents who have requested a plot. We have been trying to prioritise people who are not within walking distance of Oakley Meadows allotments as there will be no parking for allotment users of these allotments. Progress with obtaining ownership of these allotments is still very slow due to the developer's solicitor not engaging with our solicitor. We understand the developer is currently investigating this issue and await a response from them.

Allotment holders should also be aware that works to replace the water system in the Meadow allotments will take place later this year; any inconvenience should hopefully be offset by greater amenity at the conclusion of the works.

Annual inspections have taken place on the play area, the adult gym equipment, the Meadow and BMX track. Risks identified are all low. Our monthly play area inspector is looking to see if he is able to assist with any of the minor adjustments required. The clerk is liaising with the play area company to try and resolve the issues with the surfacing.

Our March article will include information about the precept and projects the Parish Council hope to undertake in 2022/23; we are aware of the rising costs of living and this will be taken into account when we set any increases in the precept.

We have applied for £1,500 from the County Councillor's grant fund for 2 picnic tables on the Meadow. These tables are suitable for residents who have dogs and are unable to access the tables in the play area.

Finally a tender document is being drawn up, by our consultants, for the car park at the edge of the Meadow (now we have planning permission). Once published we will let you advertise in the hope that there will be some local companies who wish to tender.

Our next meeting will be on 10th February at 7.30pm at the St. Chad's Centre.

#### St Chad—who was he

Chad was born in the Anglo-Saxon kingdom of Northumbria, the youngest of four sons, all of whom became priests and monks. They entered the monastery on the isle of Lindisfarne, just off the Northumberland coast, where St. Aidan was abbot. Chad's brother Cedd had founded an abbey at Lastingham in what we now know as Yorkshire and, when Cedd died, Chad was elected abbot in his place. Following the decision by the Synod of Whitby in 664 that the English church would follow the Roman



tradition rather than the Celtic tradition, Chad was appointed as bishop of the Northumbrians. However, this position had already been promised to Wilfrid and a new Archbishop of Canterbury, Theodore, asked Chad to stand down in Wilfrid's favour in 669. Chad's graciousness in acceding to Theodore's judgement impressed the archbishop and, when he was asked later that year by the king of Mercia to appoint a bishop for his kingdom, he had no hesitation in appointing Chad as bishop to the Mercians.

At that time Mercia covered an enormous area, stretching from what we think of as Lancashire and the Wirral in the north-west to Lincolnshire and the Wash in the east and down to the Bristol Chanel in the south-west. Chad moved the base of his

diocese from Repton to establish a new monastery and cathedral at Lichfield. He quickly gained the respect of his people by his wisdom, gentle character and assiduous travelling round the diocese, usually on foot. However, after only three years Chad died of plague at Lichfield on the 2<sup>nd</sup> March in 672. He was immediately afterwards venerated as a saint and his resting place in his cathedral at Lichfield became a shrine and place of pilgrimage during the Middle Ages. Lichfield cathedral is dedicated to St Chad and St Mary and has contacted all known St Chad foundations to form a St Chad's Network for this 1,350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Chad's death.



Having been for many, many centuries in the Lichfield diocese, our church in Bishop's Tachbrook is one of only 30 ancient dedications to St Chad, although the present building is not the original church here but is a 12<sup>th</sup> century replacement for the wooden one. On this 1,350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of St Chad's death I hope that as many of you as possible will come along to our Patronal Festival service at 10am on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> February to give thanks for the past, celebrate the present and pray for the future life and witness of St Chad's church.

On a clear frosty night, Orion twinkles as it rises in the south-east, two Tawny Owls call to each other near the cottage. Haven't heard that for a couple of weeks. If they've survived this far the three Owlets should be well able to look after themselves now. Across the field a Fox gives its four bark call. Mating season is well under way. Always like to have them near the cottage.

Now its colder I regularly hear Rats scurrying about after dark. They rarely give me any problems but with Foxes about the numbers will probably be kept down a bit.

Its mid January as I scribble this and around first light we now have a proper dawn chorus. Most people associate it with Spring but its off in January and gradually builds through to May.



Robins just keep singing defending territories

now joined by Wood Pigeon, Song Thrush, Mistle Thrush (Storm Cock) and a Blackbird, my favourite of all with its velvet tone. As I've said before three singing contract doesn't really start until mid Feb but I heard them in December, probably young males staking their claim. Maybe its because its was a mild start to the Winter. Even heard one singing loudly on a light in Sainsbury's car park. (other supermarkets are available).

The other early bird is the Greater Spotted Woodpecker. I hear them drumming in early Feb as a rule but they were drumming away in December. The drumming, often on a hollow branch especially selected for great acoustics, is their version of a song to stake their claim on territory. I often hear two males having a 'drum off'. Is it another sign of global warming - all this early action?

By 7.30am the Jackdaws (my lot) arrive home. They leave here about dusk and I

reckon they head off to a nearby wood to roast. They arrive back with their usual clatter, often zooming around the trees here with a real sense of excitement before settling down. Always nice to see them home. I'm soon out there, often to be met by a couple of them looking down at me from the outhouse roof. They know the drill. I give the usual call and am soon joined by 30 to 40 Jackdaws ready for breakfast. A group of female pheasants emerge from the bushes to join in. I've got 6 of them here at the moment.

Just a thought. In this cold weather the birds need water as much as food. If a bird bath is frozen then an empty tin filled with hot water soon melts the a patch when stood on the ice.

Some Snowdrops, Crocuses and Daffs are starting to push their way through and a pair of Blue Tits are already in and out of the nest box, casing the joint ahead of the game.

It seems to take forever but Spring is only a few weeks away. Well that's what I'm telling myself!




